Yours Aye Don ANDERSON The aim of this article is to explain the history behind the section. How the name of 'DASWC' was obtained and to generally give an insight into section manning and responsibilities and types of courses instructed.

Based in HMS VERNON where it was known as the IKARA SECTION. Originally it consisted of one x Lieutenant and one x CPO, the job at that time covered only the RN IKARA/ADAWS package ie documentation and instruction. Discovering the availability of men being drafted from sea with the necessary experience of the systems the workload of the section was increased to include STWS1 and CAAIS AIO.

Having settled for the increased workload, the section plodded on until the hierarchy decided MATCH should also be taught by the section as it was also a Stand Off weapon system. Consequently an unknown CPO was whisked from the Sonar Section to join this thriving department. The overall aim was to have all the Stand Off weapon systems taught by one section.

The section continued along these lines for some time until in 1977 a major move was promulgated. This was to bring the TAS/SONAR branch in line with the rest of the operations branch.

The section began in HMS DRYAD in the same situation that it can be found in today. With the introduction of newer and more complicated systems, the workload and the responsibilities have increased enormously.

The subjects at present taught include ADAWS/CAAIS AIO systems, RN IKARA, MATCH STWS1/2, MORTAR Mk 10, Command and Control, NATO ASW Weapons Torpedoes. Students range from Wrn (R) basic to CO Desig, taking in PWOs PO(S), PO(R) LS(EW), LS(S), PO(EW), WE, Acquaints and Naval Guided Weapons Cse (Civilian) not to mention the occasional visit. The updating and rewriting of Publications on the various weapons and systems are also an added responsibility. The section Tree was compiled with the assistance and "Long Standing" knowledge of Tony WALTON (see over). Any queries reference the above contact HMS DRYAD Ext 383.

- 2. Watch out for amendment number one to BR 4023, it should be issued in a month or 2. If you haven't received your revised BR 4023 dated July 1982 you will need to chase it. Thanks largely to the Naval Staff Author (ASW) in HMS VERNON Lt Cdr McGEOWN (ex TASI) this publication is now up to date and contains much new information.
- The revised Task Book One has now arrived from the printers and will be issued to all Seaman Sonar classes before leaving HMS VERNON. The main addition to this TB is sonar type 2031.

EARLY DETECTION MAKES SOUND SENSE

It was decided at the Committee Meeting held on 20 September 1982 that the ASWIs Association would 'adopt' the newly formed ELIZABETH FOUNDATION charity. The Foundation was set up to help teach all children born in Portsmouth who lack the sense we as Sonar Operators take for granted, namely the ability to HEAR. It is for the benefit of children from 0 to 5 years who are born deaf or with impaired hearing. All learning for every child begins at birth and it is widely agreed that the first 2 years are the most crucial for the development of speech and language in the hearing impaired child. Every child learns, it is only a question of what he learns; and what he learns in these early days is dependant almost entirely upon his home and his parents. Therefore the earlier the detection and diagnosis of hearing problems takes place the earlier the parents are aware of the huge task ahead of them.

THE ELIZABETH FOUNDATION provides the following services:

Educational play groups for the children, the mother stays with her child and receives help, guidance and instruction in learning the special skills necessary to teach speech and language to her own child.

Assistance, guidance and moral support is available at any time.

A qualified teacher of the deaf to give parent counselling and individual tutoring to each child.

They are purchasing good quality teaching aids, auditory training equipment and play materials.

They are raising funds to purchase special testing equipment that will aid early diagnosis in hearing impaired babies and enable them to be fitted with hearing aids between 6 and 9 months old.

ALL SERVICES ARE OFFERED FREE OF CHARGE TO ALL PARENTS

The work of the ELIZABETH FOUNDATION is financed by voluntary contributions and fund raising activities.

Can you, and will you help the Association to help these children?

To keep those of you outside SMOPS informed of the decisions being made on your behalf by the Committee it will be a regular practise in future Seamasters to give a brief synopsis of meetings Minutes. You are reminded that should you want a subject discussed then you should make use of the suggestions page at the end of the journal.

MEETING HELD 20 SEPTEMBER 1982

- 1. Association funds stand at £475.
- Decided to produce the Seamaster again going to print 3 times per year.
- Challenge from GIs to defend the 3 Monkeys Trophy accepted (we subsequently narrowly lost).
- 4. It was decided to hold an informal get together once every term during the lunch hour to allow instructors to get together over a pint. (Ed's note next get together Wednesday 9 March in POs' Mess HMS VERNON at 1200 all members of the Association welcome.)
- 5. Decision taken to look at the possibilities of adopting the Elizabeth Foundation as a charitable exercise by the Association. (Ed's note see John WHITEHEAD's article in this journal.)
- Long discussion on encouraging Sonar Senior Ratings to formally join the Association.
- 7. Paid up membership stands at 24.

MEETING HELD 18 NOVEMBER 1982

- The Chairman informed the meeting, the first Seamaster for a number of years would be distributed within 14 days.
- Decided that PO(S) courses be encouraged to join the Association on completion of course.

- Decided that the next AGM should be late April/early May.
- It was decided that on the day of the next AGM and thereafter all non-paid up Sonar personnel would no longer be considered as members of the Association.
- 5. It was agreed that LS(S) on completion of course be given free membership of the Association until such time as they are rated PO. They would not however be able to attend social functions until rated.

CPO(OPS)(S) A R BARRETT PO(S) T R LEWIS HMS GALATEA At Mombassa

Dear Members,

Now that we have been deployed on ARMILLA Patrol for the last 2 months we decided that it is time we put pen to paper, and tell you all about the events that have kept us busy. Before going any further we would like to thank you for the copy of "THE SEAMASTER" we received, we enjoyed it and it is nice to know where all our fellow mariners are.

When OPERATION CORPORATE came into force it changed our programme in many ways. Ted joined GALATEA in Gibraltar in the middle of May 1982 to bring the ship back to GUZZ. Because of being on course I never joined until the beginning of June 1982. Many thanks to all the DASWC team in SMOPS HMS DRYAD for their help. The first effect was that Gib Refit Group had left GALATEA in a terrible state, to which we are still feeling the effects - secondly none of our lads were able to do any PJTs and with the exception of one trained 199 operator and 2 trained 170 operators we were beginning to have problems. It was at this stage that it was decided that we would have a 7 week work up - thridly we had very few BRs, still awaiting, and no 1077.

Before we went to Portland we became CORPORATE so that meant the ship going completely grey - this gave us all a strange feeling - Stewart BROWN from FOF2 came onboard to do our pre Staff Sea Check, and we thank him for all his help. The next problem was our 184 which after many attempts to fudge, we excepted on the 13th time, however the result was the lads had lost confidence in their 184.

We started work up on 1 August 1982 - and although the lads were cheerful enough it was an uphill climb. Many thanks are owed to Nobby NOBLE, Ginge FELL, Jim PARKS, Paul HITCHCOCK and a special thanks to Dodger LONG, it was also nice to see Pusser HILL call on us - we finally left Portland 16 September 1982 to return to GUZZ and a fortnight's leave.

On return from leave things began to happen in earnest, store ship, more firefighting equipment, fire curtains, an extra gun and finally ammunition ship. It was not until late October that the decision was made to take us off of CORPORATE and that we would not be going South. Before sailing on deployment Don ANDERSON came onboard to see Ted on feedback, Ted said he had gained a lot from his visit, also Jacko JACKSON paid us a visit, it was nice to see so many were taking an interest in us.

Finally on 1 November 1982 we sailed from GUZZ and joined up on an ASW exercise, but because of troubles and trials we only managed to stay in the exercise for 4 hours before moving on down to Gib. We arrived at Gib on 5 November for 4 hours, long enough to take part in the Squadron Sports before sailing on to the Suez Canal, which we transitted on 11 and 12 November.

The places we have visited so far are Port Sudan, 14-17 November, a flying visit to Diego Garcia 24-26 November, Colombo 29 November-3 December, back to Diego Garcia 7-10 December, and we have been in Mombassa since 17 December and are due to sail 4 January 1983. Our programme changes so quick and so often that we are likely to spend it as Diego Garcia Guardship.

We are now on ARMILLA Patrol with HMNZ CANTERBURY who have been with us since 2 January 1982, good crowd but drink happy, they are staying with us until we go off Station when they return to New Zealand.

Some of the problems we have had working with the Kiwis is when we put the SLUTT in the water they wanted it set to their 177 frequency, which meant we got very little value as we were doing a Stand Off IKARA firing. However we had a very useful UWT exercise with them, which we hope to repeat. Other problems we had but are slowly over coming are:

a. Painting V Training.

- b. Shortage of ASW stores and BRs.
- c. Standards of XBTs and range prediction to all levels of operators.
- d. No 1077 for further training, although we do carry out Simtacks.
- e. No feedback from Passive Tapes sent in.

Well if you are still awake and with us, all there is left to say is, hope you all have a Happy New Year with best wishes from all the lads of GALATEA.

By the way I am due to leave GALATEA 18 September 1983 if anyone is interested, next step CIVVY STREET.

Dear Ed and Readers,

For the untold millions who have not had the unfortunate experience of knowing me, I am the link man for General Service Training in the Joint Acoustic Analysis Centre in this capacity I am writing this little 'DIT' to let you all know I, in my limited wisdom, am in the throes of producing a new set of training tapes for the Fleet entitled 'The Surface Ship Acoustic Training Series' which will replace the SMOPS Continuation Training Tapes now held in the Fleet. The Series will consist of the following:

Tape 1 - Transmission Intercept and associated instruction book. This tape will teach the breakdown of a transmission ie TX interval, pulse type, number of pulses also tape speed translation.

Tape 2 - An exercise in Transmission Intercept (using NATO sonars).

Tape 3 - Introducing Audio Analysis and associated instruction book. This tape will teach propeller shaft revolution counting (RPM and frequency) determining the number of blades and aural classification clues.

Tape 4 - An exercise in Audio Analysis including answer sheet. (A DEMON gram book associated with this tape has been produced and will be held by Passive Sonar Section HMS VERNON).

Tape 5 - 45 mins of Ship and Submarine Radiated Aural Characteristics likely to be encountered by the Sonar Operator whilst operating in the Passive Mode, associated instructing book included with this tape.

Recordings of any torpedoes recorded through any Surface Ships Sonars.
