

CI(S) IS DEAD! - LONG LIVE UFAO!!!

For as long as I can remember (circa 1959) Room 107 Creasy West, HMS VERNON has been occupied by a harassed looking CPO of various shapes and size, who acted as if the world was about to come to an end (or already had) and took the brickbat for everything that went wrong in the sonar world!

He went by the title of CI(S) - Chief Instructor Sonar. Like everything else in the RN the Sonar Branch has been subject to much change over the past few years, both in branch structure and equipment, particularly since the formation of the Operations Branch - and like Topsy we just grew and grew.

The Underwater Warfare Faculty of SMOPS has many tentacles and because the 'Octopus' has so many diverse interests and a wide scope of training requirements one tentacle has not necessarily known what the others are doing! As many of you will already know VERNON is due for partial closure in 1986 and as part of that closure plan U Faculty living in VERNON will move lock, stock and barrel to SMOPS HMS DRYAD around mid 1985. The exact timing of the move will depend on the completion of the new Training Block and ASUAT Park. Once the move has taken place we shall come into much closer contact with many other 'Octopuses' all writhing about and intent on a wide variety of differing activities. So in order that our particular part of the Ocean doesn't become so clouded with ink that we can't see our objectives it has been decided to re-organise our administration well before the move.

To achieve this the billet of CI(S) is now defunct and a new job has been created for a FCPO(OPS)(S) under the title of UFAO - U Faculty Administration Officer. The "first of the class" is yours truly, FCPO Chris HARTLEY, and I am currently involved in getting the new regime off the ground. We are still in the 'suck it and see' stage at the moment but on the whole things seem to be progressing smoothly.

The new organisation simply consists of a central U Faculty Administration Office (old Active Sonar Office) from where the everyday general administration of the Active Sonar, Passive Sonar, Oceanography and Training Support Sections (and eventually DASWC) is co-ordinated, although the actual training activities of each Section are not affected. It is very much a manpower planning, training equipment and 'trouble shooting' job along the lines of CI(S), but a bit bigger.

Another large part of the job initially is to co-ordinate the move to HMS DRYAD - taking everything with us from pencils to ASUATs and locking the doors and turning out the lights as we leave Creasy West for the last time!!

Many of us will have mixed feelings about leaving VERNON and its familiar surroundings that we have known for many years but I feel sure that we can look forward to a warm welcome in HMS DRYAD in a brand new Training Block and in a way a new beginning for the Sonar Branch.

Meanwhile CI(S) is dead - long live UFAO!

The telephone number for any problems or queries which the U Faculty may be able to help with remains as always - Ext 24811 - and the old TASIs saying is still relevant too - "I may not have the answer to hand - but I'll find out by stand easy!!!".

Dear Ed,

At the time of writing we are having to 'rough it' just south of the Equator in hot 'pursuit of coconut pirates' whom I'm sure you've all heard about. I'm writing to thank you for the Seamaster which caught up with me just after a good night stop in Gibraltar. After a very different run ashore in Jeddah we went south and into the Indian Ocean with the Waikato.

If the magazine keeps on growing at the steady rate it appears to be you will soon have to be distributing it in volumes! I hope that the Annual Dinner goes down well as I'm sure it will, but at the time of the dinner Chris BEECHEY has promised to take me ashore in Singapore.

A couple of things I would like to know is how to get certain stores nowadays. I'm not questioning the onboard 'Jack Dusties' capabilities they couldn't have been more helpful, it appears to be the shore side. My predecessor placed an order for Centigrade/Metric XBT paper rolls some 9 months since, all we have received in return have been Fahrenheit/Feet with no explanation. The only way I've been able to obtain C/Metric rolls is to go to the Waikato or write to Oppos around the Fleet. There are so many Feet/F rolls onboard that it is unbelievable but as many of you know 2016 is a metric system and to have to start to convert Imperial to Metric is just making work. Also time consuming.

The other point I would like to make is why can't the 'Pusser' standardise 'bits of Kit'. For instance the Racal Tape Recorder can be ordered under one stock number and lo and behold you receive a Tape Recorder with all the associated pieces of equipment that make it work. But if you order it another number all you receive is a Tape Recorder and when you order the other pieces of kit an answer comes back of not available or not entitled because it is an RAF store and PO(S)s on ships are not entitled to draw them.

I would be very interested if any one has had any similar experiences in obtaining Tape Recording equipment or in my case the lack of equipment. Many thanks to Kevin HOWES on the BRAZEN for the 'Rabbits'. See you out here before we set off back home for Christmas.

Hope I haven't presented too much of a 'Drip Chit' keep up the good work with the Mag.

Dear Sir,

I arrived in the UK from New Zealand last July to commence an ADAWS EQ in HMS DRYAD prior to posting to HMNZS SOUTHLAND (Ex DIDO) presently in refit at Vosper Shipbuilders, Southampton.

On completion of the EQ I was invited to join the staff of the U Faculty on temporary attachment where I have remained until this time. Shortly however attachment sadly comes to an end as I am rejoining my ship and putting into practice the many lessons I have learnt over the last few months. I would therefore like to further take this opportunity to thank all the staff of the U Faculty in both HMS VERNON and HMS DRYAD who have unhesitatingly given myself and my crew their assistance and support at all levels. To name everyone would be impossible but I would like to make special mention of the staff of the PO (Sonar) course and DAWSC section HMS DRYAD whose co-operation has smoothed the path for our ongoing training.

For those Ex DIDO personnel you might be interested to know that during refit we removed the mortars and fitted torpedo tubes and replaced the 184M with the Graseby 750 sonar, virtually a swept up solid state version of the 184. Taking over an IKARA Leander when you come from an entirely manual 177M fitted Navy is quite daunting; however, the crew is enthusiastic and I am confident we will eventually become an efficient fighting unit.

The ship will be in UK waters until May next year following a Portland work-up and arriving back in New Zealand in July, so your offices are not safe from the occasional 'GIZZIT' raid just yet. I don't know why but recently it seems that whenever we come to pay a purely social visit around the bazaars these days there's a flurry of locking things away and cries of 'We haven't got any!'. Strange that.

In conclusion I would like to say how much my wife and myself enjoyed ourselves at the ASWIs Annual Dinner. An excellent evening, the details of which have been relayed to my parent association in New Zealand, who have informed me that your hospitality will be returned in kind to the Task Force which is due in New Zealand shortly.

This is a new section added to the Seamaster which has been suggested by FCPO R NICHOLLS who has supplied the first 3 articles. It is hoped that you at sea will contribute in the future any interesting subject which is UNCLASSIFIED and of course of a Naval or ASW nature.

SOVIET SUBSUNK CHARLIE CLASS

According to US Officials, a serious submarine accident has occurred in deep water off the Naval Base of "Pelroparlovsk", on the Kamchatka Peninsular.

Soviet salvage and diving vessels successfully raised the wrecked submarine in August. It is thought that the accident occurred during June.

Very few details are known but the loss of life must have been high and the boat was reported as a "CHARLIE CLASS". The Soviet Navy has not forgetten how the CIA project "OPERATION JENNIFER" managed to raise most of a Golf Class submarine in the Pacific in late 1974. This is the second nuclear boat known to have been lost, the other being a November Class in the South Western Approaches in April 1970.

Of course the US Navy has had its accidents too, with the loss of "THRESHER" and "SCORPION" both nuclear attack boats. The first was during trials, the latter in interesting and unexplained circumstances West of the Azores. Both were in deep water and very little was recovered from their hulls, fragments and debris was scattered over a large area.

STUFT CONTINUES

The use of merchant shipping from "OPERATION CORPORATE" is still supporting South Atlantic operations. The latest large project is the news of the container ship "ASTRONOMER". Almost twice the size of Atlantic Conveyor she is being converted using the USN "ARAPHO" system. This comprises a prefabricated helo deck, containerised workshops and hanger area, some 70 containers in all. ASTRONOMER will probably become an RFA on completion. British Aerospace the main contractor has long been promoting what it calls "SCADS", shipborne Containerised Air Defence Systems. This involves fitting point defence missile systems in 'STUFT' vessels. British Aerospace also have a plan for containerised IKARA.

SWEDEN CHANGES ASW INTRUDER RULES

After many submarine incidents into her territorial waters Sweden has now changed her rules of engagement to such that weapons may now be accurately used, to force a submarine to surface.

This will be achieved by the introduction of 2 new ASW weapons.

THE MARLIN

This is a magnetic limpet bleeper which transmits sonar pulses after attaching itself to the intruder's hull. It was reported to have been used last year in the Harsfgarden incident. It apparently successfully attached itself for about 30 minutes before it was removed by a diver from the submarine.

Had rules of engagement at the time allowed explosives to be accurately used, the submarine would in all probability have been forced to the surface.

THE ELMA

This is a new depth charge with a hollow charge warhead designed only to punch a small hole in the pressure hull. This can be used instead of full weight action charges which could well destroy the submarine. Presumably one or a number of ELMA charges would overload the damage control pumping systems forcing to surface.

It will be interesting to see if these new weapons and criteria change the advantage the submarine has in these shallow waters within uneven bottoms, granite outcrops and soft silt. The metal debris is also high as locals place old cars and refrigerators etc on the ice in winter and use the frozen ice as a garbage dump. In spring this moves and sinks making any form of MAD equipment virtually useless.

Perhaps a return of the old boom nets and snag lines could be a more effective cheap ASW countermeasure.

- b. After discussion it was agreed that Sunday 29 July be tentatively pencilled in.
- 4. Three Monkeys Trophy. This is competed for in a Social Indoor Games Competition evening. Don ANDERSON promised that the ASWI's would challenge the PRI's, the current holders, early in 1984.

Amalgamation of the Social Aspects of the PRIs/ASWIs.

- a. John NEWING began by giving the meeting the latest update on the planned rebuild of the SRs Mess in HMS DRYAD. The current completion date is May 1986, but it is hoped that varying stages of the rebuild will be ready for occupation during 1985. The move of the U Faculty to HMS DRYAD will take place about mid 1985 and therefore an early decision on the proposed social merger of the PRI/ASWI Associations is desirable.
- b. Eligibility for membership of the ASWI (and GIs) Association is extended to qualified POs and above. This continues to be the major stumbling block in the proposed merger as the PRIs remain adamant that their membership should remain as it is. Much discussion ensued as to the respective advantages or disadvantages of various proposals but no agreement could be reached.

It was therefore decided that John NEWING would discuss the problem with his President (Captain EMOPS) and his membership to see if a more flexible system of membership could be adopted in order that PO members of the ASWI Association be allowed to use club facilities.

- c. John NEWING undertook to give an answer as soon as possible in order that a firm proposal may be put to the ASWI's Association members by postal ballot. Whatever the outcome Don ANDERSON promised to give a final decision on the matter to the PRI's Association by 1 June 1984.
- 6. There being no further business the meeting was closed at 1120.
