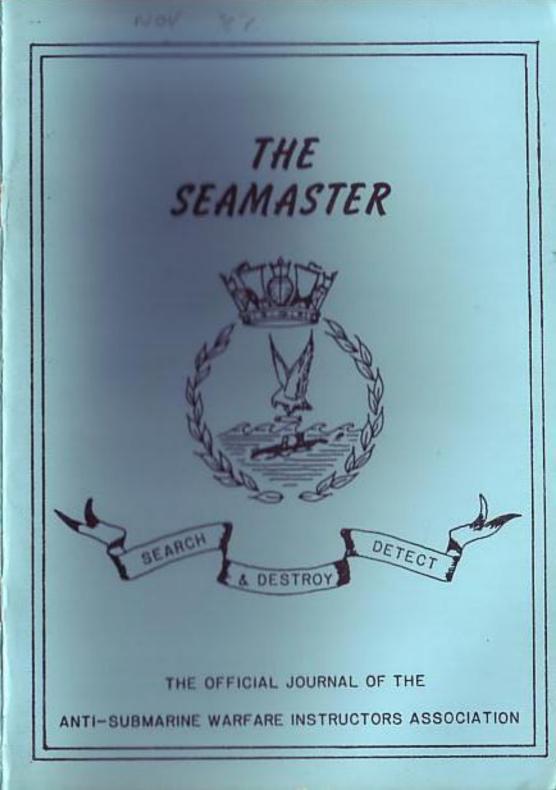

FEEDBACK - TASK BOOKS - WPE

FEEDBACK

No doubt quite a few of you who were interviewed over the last year are still ploughing your way through the latest feedback report Summer 1987. I do hope that the points raised reflect some of your anxieties, frustrations etc. As you know feedback is essential as it is the only way of measuring the effectiveness of training carried out at the School of Maritime Operations HMS Dryad. The report is especially welcome by Fleet (FASWO) the FOFs and FOST, as it highlights many of our shortcomings in the training world especially those experienced at sea.

There was one particular item in the report which I feel needs some mention in this article. It is aparent that most of us are ignorant of the Naval Training System. Many Officers and Senior Ratings are unaware that when a man completes a career course IS(S) PO(S) or ASW Sensor Coordinators course he must then achieve his Operational Objectives for him to complete his training as he only achieves a Training Standard on completion of career course. The gap must be filled at sea. However as stated in the report ships are sometimes unable to achieve this training because of many factors, i.e. Ships programmes, lack of proper training aids, etc. Ships must not expect a man who arrives onboard having completed a career course to be that 'all singing, all dancing' Sonar Controller or ASWD, he needs further training, OJT, to bring him to _ operational standard, and if ships are unable to fulfill the training they must report the fact to their FOFs. If you are one of those interviewed and have not yet seen the report make sure you do so.

Once again thank you to all those who gave up their valuable time to be interviewed your cooperation is

appreciated. On a final note. Please inform your PWOs/ COs that my visit is not an inspection. It is an analysis of training. Ships names and personalities are never mentioned in the report and the interviewes are conducted hopefully on an informal basis.

WPE

"It's Working Folks" The results of the last two
Examinations, June and September are very encouraging,
Well done to both yourselves, the instructors and to the
candidates who undoubtly put a lot of preparartion and
hard work in to achieve this success. The last
examination produced a 90% pass rate overall.

I am sure that most of you are aware of the standard required. It is high and I believe that to be correct. Remember that the man you are training may come back as your controller or ASWD/PSD. Ensure your PWO's are aware of the training requirements to complete Taskbooks. These books must be taken seriously, and completed concienciously. I have advised many of you that if you have men ready to take the WPE ensure you give them a dummy board. (Old WPEs can be obtained from me or your FOFs on request.)

It is also important that the man is worthy of the next higher rate and careful thought must be given to his ability before being recommended. Application for the WPE is made on as S442 in duplicate, make sure that the S442 is annotated with the name of the sonar in which he was trained i.e. 184, 2016, 2031I or 2031Z. This is very important so as to enable the WPE section in Dryad to forward the correct papers and for Drafty to draft him for the correct course.

The next WPE takes place in December. The DCI for the 1988 WPE is also sent out in December. Make sure you get to see it.

SCHAR TASK BOOKS

These are under-going a complete re-write, the process is slow. I anticipate that Task book 3 will be out to the fleet in the summer '88.

The books take on a completelly new look which will hopefully help both Instructors and sonar ratings completing them. They are much more comprehensive, and hopefully they reflect all the suggestions given to me during my feedback visits.

Their contents reflect the requirements brought about the Post Sonarman study and the new Sonar Career Courses. They will be in three sections. Common, (part 1) Active (part 2) and Passive (part 3). Part 1 will be completed by both Active and Passive Rates. A choice then can be made between Parts 2 and 3.

I would finally like to remind you that if you have any suggestions to make on the content of task books please do not hesitate to contact me on Dryad 4574.

I have also in my goodies cupboard new Task book Bar charts and Sonar Watch and Station bills, if you need these please contact me.

PASSIVE TASK BOOKS GRAM AND TAPE EXAMINATION

The requirement to complete Tapes and Gram on completion of the task book is no longer essential. The Tape and Gram can be taken at any time but ratings must be successful in both before application for the written Provisional Examination is made.

It is also important that the man is recommended by you before he takes the Gram and Tape examinations. If the rating fails only one part he is only required to take that part again not both. Three months must elapse before the retake. Examinations can only take place in the STC Devonport or at HMS Dryad.

THE ASWD's PJT

Gentlemen,

At present our contemporaries in the RADAR, MISSILE and E.W. branches enjoy a draftable 5 week E.Q. if they have been away from systems for more than 18 months. This gives them the confidence that they are up to date and speed before joining their ships. We at present are denied this luxury.

Having recognised the need to give the ASWD a fighting chance on his return to sea after X amount of months ashore, a proposal was made to the H.O.D. for a PJT package.

This has now been approved but as with most things nowadays in an abbreviated form. They have allowed us 3 weeks which in the main is taken up with the "COOK" cycle of weeks and 5 i.e. The Full Command Team. The rest of the time is made up of updates in TCN's, Voice Procedures, General Training Admin., Watchbills, FCD 3, Casex Signals, MTMS, Weapons, Oceanography, Button Crunching in ADAJS or CAAIS, a little bit of Passive and a day in ASUAT 6. So you can see a very full programme.

Every effort will be made to keep it as a "PRACTICAL" PJT with minimal formal theory instruction. The first PJT is planned to run in January '88. The PO(3) Course Office will do most of the organisation/administration.

Little else need be said at this stage. A further update will appear in the SEAMASTER after suitable feedback from the first course. It is a good step in the right direction for us to improve initial standard: at sea. This PJT does not deny us the opportunity

to be trained in further systems required by our new draft.

RANGE OF THE DAY - IN MEMORIAM

'Range of the day ' is dead! We all know that active sonar initial detection ranges depend on target type and on target aspect. A beam aspect submarine is usually detected at considerably greater ranges than one presenting a bow aspect, especially with modern sonars. It is therefore no longer adequate to produce a predicted sonar range based on a 'random aspect' target: we need to give a RANGE BRACKET.

The upper figure represents the range beyond which the probability of detection is less than 50%, even with a beam aspect submarine. The lower figure represents the range within which the probability of detection is greater than 50% even with a bow aspect submarine. The resulting range bracket therefore gives much more meaningful and useful information. R I P 'range of the day'.

AOC HMG DRYAD

SS Peking

Peking was built for Firdinand Laeisz's shipping Company by Blohm and Voss in 1911.

She was built to carry grain and nitrates from the port Hamburg to Chile or Australia, making the passage more than once between Chile and Hamburg in 66 days, averaging some 16 knots ver long periods.

After the 1914/18 war she was loaned to Italy as war reparations and later sold back to her original owner F Laeisz for £8500 on January 1 1923.

F Laeisz continued to sail her to Chile and Australia up to 1932. Her last passage in 1932 was Taltal - Santander in 71 days. After her last passage she was laid up for only 3 weeks before being sold to Shaftesbury Homes for £6500.

She was brought over from Hamburg to Strood in Kent by Knights tugs of Rochester, Kent.

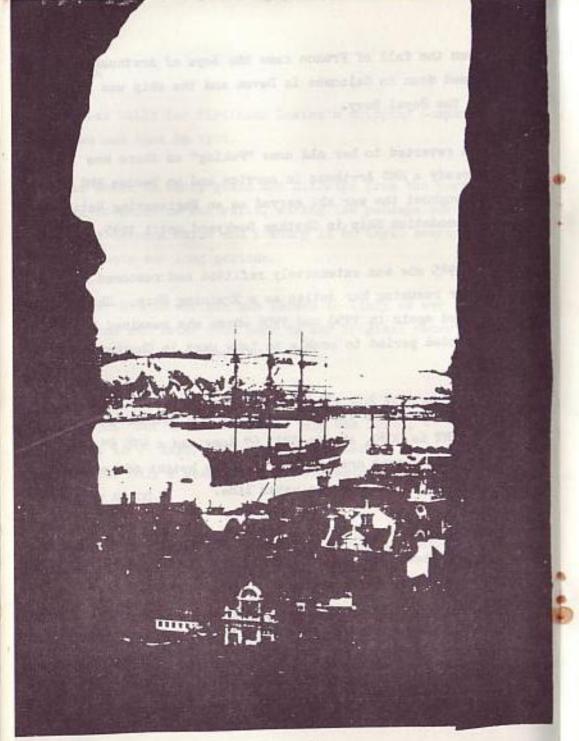
After being converted to a Boys Training Ship, she was remoored at Lower Upnor, Kent. On the 25 July 1933 she was renamed "Arethusa" (after the wooden frigate at Greenhithe, which she replaced) by the late Prince George, Duke of Kent. She reverted to her old name "Peking" as there was already a HMS Arethusa in service and so became HMS Peking. Throughout the war she served as an Engineering Ratings Accommodation Ship in Chatham Dockyard until 1945.

In 1945 she was extensively refitted and remoored off Upnor resuming her duties as a Training Ship. She was docked again in 1950 and 1956 where she remained for an extended period to enable to take part in Chatham Navy Days.

The Peking has a fine flared bow and a counter stern. Her GRT is 3089, she is 322' 6" long and a 478 8" beam. Her deep summer draught is 25'. The height of her steel masts is 173' above the water line.

During the 1956 docking she was rerated 100 A1 at Lloyds as a Harbour Craft. After her last docking (1970) she emerged minus her top masts.

In 1974 the Arethusa (25 July) closed down as a training ship. She stood idle for 4 months before being sold to the Sea Port Museum New York. She now lies in New York Harbour, rerigged in all respects as a sailing ship.

F Laeisz and Company - Hamburg

The German firm of Firdinand Laeisz of Hamburg dominated Nitrate trade, which was never attractive to British sailing ship owners to anything like the same extent. The German Fleet sailed regularly out of Hamburg which came to be known among seamen as the Flying 'P'. Incidently, sailing ship men always referred to the cargo as 'Saltpetre', a cargo of great demand in those days as chemical manure and in the preparation of explosives.

Such was Laeisz's organisation on the West Coast that before harbour stow was finished the hatches were off for discharging or loading. Despatch at loading or discharge ports was just as efficiently organised as the manning and running of his ships.

In the early days the crews (and Masters) were hand-picked most of the former being local men with home ties in or around Hamburg. F rdinand Laeisz started as a ship owner with the wood brig, Carl in 1840 but sold her seven years later at half her purchase price and until 1855 was without a ship. In that year he purchased the 195 ton wood schooner "Sophie und Freidericke" from W and S Sauer of Hamburg. From this time onwards the business prospered. Two years later the first of the "P" ships was the wood barque "Pudel" built for Laeisz in 1857 by Stulcken at Hamburg. Although Stulcken was a good friend of the Laeisz family the "Pudel" was the only ship built by him

for the firm.

By 1865 the Fleet had grown to eleven ships and in 1867 Laeisz bought from J J Buhr Hamburg his last six ships, these were the : Mercedes, Don Julio, Carolina, Ricardo, Henrique, Theodore and Rosa/Isobel all built between 1862 and 1865. These six ships totalled 2556 tons.

Early in 1879 Firdinand Laeisz Grandson Carl Firdinand Laeisz entered the family partnership of the firm which at that time owned 17 ships with a total tonnage of 8641 tons. The first ship that the Laeisz had that topped the 1000 ton mark was the iron ship Pluto ex Aminto acquired from Moore and Co of Liverpool 1881. This ship was built by Messrs Jones Quiggin and Co in 1862 shortly before these enterprising ship builders of Liverpool launched the first steel sailing ship known as the Formby.

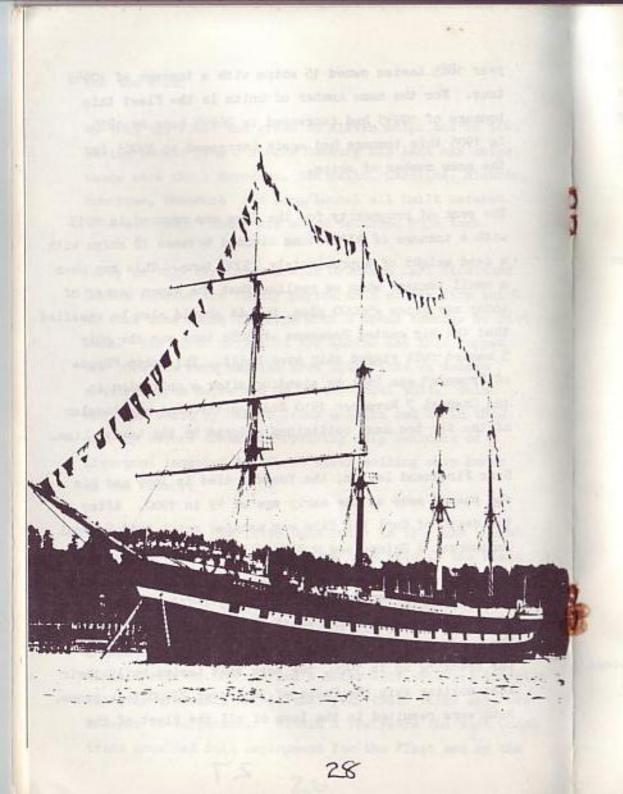
The wood barque Henriette Behn built in 1872 and bought by Laeisz 3 years later, was the last ship in the Fleet to bear a tally not prefixed by the letter'P' - all Laeisz's sailing ships thereafter conforming to this pattern. This oddly named barque was driven ashore in a hurricane and lost off Mazattan, Mexico in November 1885. Prior to 1862 Laeisz's ships were employed tramping all over the world but in that year their first ship was ordered to Valparaiso. Within a few years the West Coast trade provided full employment for the Fleet and by the

year 1885 Laeisz owned 15 ships with a tonnage of 10945 tons. For the same number of units in the Fleet this tonnage of 10945 had increased to 26494 tons by 1895. In 1905 this tonnage had again increased to 35065 for the same number of ships.

The peak of prosperity for the firm was reached in 1913 with a tonnage of 43299 tons divided between 18 ships with a dead weight of approximately 73000 tons. This may seem a small tonnage when we realise that the super tanker of today may gross 250000 plus, but it should also be recalled that the big masted Preussen of 5081 tons was the only 5 masted full rigged ship ever built. This ship "Pride of Prussia" was lost by standing after a collision in the Channel 7 November 1910 and was the most spectacular of the far too many collisions endured by the Laeisz line.

Herr Firdinand Laeisz, the founder died in 1887 and his son passed away at the early age of 47 in 1900. After the death of Carl the firm was managed until 1912 by Paul Ganssabge, J Reisse and W Struck.

Then Carl Ferdinand's sons Hervert and Erik became of age and entered the firm which still operated from Hamburg. The Bordes Company disposed of their last sailing ship for breaking up in 1926, the year that Laeisz built their last sailing ship the Padua of just over 23000 tons gross. Both wars resulted in the loss of all the Fleet of the



flying 'P' line. After the first disaster the Laeisz Fleet was rebuilt but after 1945 the new re-birth did not include sailing ships.

Around 1880 regular monthly sailings were started from Hamburg with a departure from Antwerp every second month. Ofcourse the 1914-18 war put a stop to that. Throughout the long history of the flying 'P' line a total of 82 ships had been owned by them although for the record it must be added that the Pola 4m barque built for Laeisz. Perkeo was purchased in New York in the summer of 1914 and was captured on 2 August 1914 by a British Cruiser in the Channel. The Pola was taken over by France in 1920 and renamed Richelieu it was used as a training ship until destroyed by fire and explosion at Baltimore on 4 January 1927. Laeisz during his change over period sold the Peking in 1933 to become the training ship Arethusa. The well known Passat was the sister ship to the Peking.

It was claimed by a passenger who sailed from Hamburg to Chile on board the Peking that at that time her Captain was rounding the Horn for the 52nd time on board a sailing vessel; but a Captain Joseph Warren Holmes was reported in the Conneticut magazine issue of 1899 as having rounded Cape Horn 83 times.

As an example of the standard of performance required of Laeisz's masters here is the sad story of the steel ship Pellworm, 2270 tons which was bought by Laeisz in 1924 during his struggle to rebuild the Fleet. On her first outward passage (Ballast) for Laeisz she was unable to round the north and was compelled to return to Hamburg. This was a vicious decision for in the opinion of many experienced seamen not even the Devil of Hamburg himself could have prevailed against Cape Stiff with Pellworm on that passage - ill balasted as she was.

What was so important about nitrate that it needed express delivery? Could it be that the sinister demands of the explosive industry in Germany, pre 1914 provided the answer?

The success of the German Firm can be mounted up to a number of facts which are worth mentioning. About the year 1880 a new look in the shipbuilding technique was looked upon by British builders. This was known as the Liverpool House of Midships Bridge which consisted of a long midship deck raised above bulwark level which prevented the vessel being bourne down by the weight of water shipped in the latitude of the Horn and enabled men to work the ship in near enough safety. About the same time a Scottish Shipmaster JCB Jarves of Tay Port of sailing ships in heavy weather. Later in the last century Commander MF Maury, an American Hydrographer resented his report on ocean meteorology to the International Conference in 1881 based on his vast collection of ships' wind and weather reports.

Maury's contribution to the scientific methods of navigation was invaluable. Further improvements in the form halliard winches also came along in the 1920s and the Laeisz Company took full advantage of all advances made. Thus a smooth and efficiently run company.
