

With 'Passive Perestroika' almost upon us (a.k.a. the U Faculty re-organisation) and despite being light years behind the Fleet - in that we're still at the 'Them and Us' stage - we of the ' 'silent persuasion' have actually started communicating with our transmitting brothers (formerly known as taxgets ping besuns torpede homing beacons active rates!). To this end CPO (ASWSC desig) Brian Walsh carried out a quick 'step aside', found himself in the Passive Instructors Office, switched to transmit and sent a ping down the bearing (note the 'active terminology. good eh?). I was ' drifting' around the office, switched to receive, processed the jolly old sound wave and converted it into a question about the new 'Upholder' class. Having asked around it transpired that very few people know much about the new class so in a vague attempt to plug this little gap - I decided to sit down and write a quick dit for the Seamaster.

Now, at this stage dear reader, you may be wondering why there has been such a large gap between this article and my previous collection of mundame twitterings. Well, were the truth be known,

being of an extremely sensitive nature, easily hurt, upset by other peoples opinions. . . (hang on a minute, Scouse Rimmer has just fallen off his chair and is now rolling around the floor giggling hystericall.) Where was I? , can't remember , anyway, after my shoddy reception my Global '86 article got I decided to hang up my quill as it were. However, having sulked for several months my literary urges finally got the better of me, hence the article.

Right, the Upholder (originally known as the 2400), before I go any further I'd better point out that this article is only based on what I've read in Janes Defence Weekly's International Defence Reviews etc so although it can't be used as a hard end fast reference is is unclassified and as such could be used as 'background knowledge' if need be. So, first things first, some general info on the class:-


18 Torpedoes carried, currently Tigerfish but these will be replaced by Spearfish. In addition, the Upholder will be fitted with the Fire Control system for Sub Harpoon. 36 x Stonefish mines can be carried in lieu of torpedoes.

Background

So, why are they being built?, obvicusly the Oberon class - despite many years of excellent service throughout theworld - are now reaching the end of their useful lives. However the R N initially appeared to take the American view(that of no further future for the conventional s/ms) fortunately all the inherant advantages of conventional boats (ie quietness of operation, building/running costs, versatility etc) were obviously plugged by a staunch supporter somewhere along the line, which caused a re-appraisal of the situation. In addition to this, with the approval for the Trident programme there would be something like an 8 year gap in the SSN building schedule(this is because

Vickers in Barrow is now the only remaining yard with the necessary nuclear construction expertise). To fill this gap a new class of conventional S/m was called for; this new class would incorporate as much of the technology as possible from the nuclear programme whilst still all the advantages of a conventional boat.

Construction



The hull form is closely modelled on that of the SSN's with the now familiar high beam to length ratio. It is of single hull construction with a cylindrical pressure hull (made of HY80 equivalent steel) that is capped fwd and aft by domed bulkheads; this pressure hull is divided into three main watertight compartments by the use of two watertight bulkheads. This in itself is unusual in this day and age as most modern submarines of European manufacture do not have very strong internal bulkheads - the main exception

being the German 209 class - however, I don't suppose that the Submariners complain! The fin itself is mainly of GRP construction.

As you can see from the above diagram, the size of the pressure hull allows a two deck layout, the fwd section contains the weapon storage area with part of the accomodation situated on the lower deck(extensive use of automation has allowed the complement to be reduced to 44). The control centre, communications shack and ESM are all situated beneath the fin between the two watertight bulkheads, below this area can be found more accomodation and the general messing area, with the auxilliary machinery room aft the accomodation deck. beneath the lower deck are two banks of Chloride leadacid batteries each containing 240 cells. This capacity gives the Upholders an underwater endurance that surpasses the Oberons by something in the region of 45%.

Aft of the second watertight bulkhead is the machinery space, this is split into two sections by the use of an accustic bulkhead. The fwd section of the machinery space is the Generator room, this contains the two Paxman 16 cylinder Diesel Generators that are raft mounted and situated above the fuel tanks. The after part of the machinery space is known as the Motor room and contains a G.E.C. Electric Propulsion Motor(EPM) that consists of two motors in a common frame with two armatures on a common shaft. This arrangement allows

parallel or series combinations (this system is employed in the Oberons and is commonly called 'Grouping', it allows the speed of the boat to be altered by varying the voltage across the armatures in the main motor) giving a continuous speed between 4 and 20 Kts, a separate motor generator is fitted for speeds below 4 Knts. This arrangement - in conjunction with the 'Albacore' hull gives the Upholders a very high underwater speed.

Weapons

The Upholders are fitted with 6 twentyone inch(533mm) torpedo tubes in the bows which are disposed in two banks(two in the upper bank and the remaining four in the lower), positive discharge is used to allow: the torpedoes to be fired from any depth. Stowage is available for a further 12 weapons allowing a total weapon load of 18 torpedoes. Initially the Tigerfish will be carried but these will be replaced by the Marconi Spearfish which is designed to counter the latest classes of Soviet SSMs.

The torpedoes can be replaced by mines with two mines being carried by in lieu of each torpedo, this allows a total of 36 mines to be carried. In practice this would not happen and the boats would probably deploy with a mixed load of torpedoes and mines.

Sensors

The main sonar is the combined Active/Passive Type 2040, this is of a French design, with the Passive array comprising a triple tier 48 stave circular transducer fitted in the bow and the Active component fitted in the fin. Additionally, the 2007 Passive flank array is fitted as is the 2019 Active sonar intercept set and the 2026 Towed Array system.


The DCC Action Information Organisation(AIO) and fire control system is based on the DCA/DCB system fitted in the SSNs and incorporates two FM1600E computers; this allows up to 35 targets to be tracked and automatic can be provided for four torpedoes against four separate targets.

In Conclusion

The first boat was laid down at Earrows in '83 and entered service this year, in january '86 a further three boats were ordered from Cammel Laird(leaving barrows free to concentrate on the Tridents). It is believed that the class may eventually number 10 with hull 5 enwards being of a 'stretched'design (approx 3000 tons) to improve endurance. Thats it ! end of dit, I trust it was beneficial, who knows, with all these improvements in accomodation perhaps next years Review Board will turn their attention to Submarine Pay.....

HMS COSSACK - 8th DESTROYER FLOTILLA

The disposition of the Far East Fleet, early 1950, ranged from ships on the Japanese Summer Cruise, Subic Bay, Yangste Patrol, Malayan Patrol, and major refits at the Singapore Naval Base, If you were lucky!

In spite of the Navy having to play a supporting role to the Army, the Senior Service is not easily upstaged at the best of times by any of the other Services. The Korean War was no exception, for the Navy firmly grabbed the historical record of being the first of the three Services to come to grips with the enemy: this was the occasion when HMS Jamaica exchanged shellfire with enemy shore batteries, sustaining the first British casualties (naval and military) in the Korean War, at a time when she was transporting members of the now legendary 27th Independent infantry Brigade from the Hong Kong theatre to the Korean theatre of war, shortly effer the war started in 1950.

The 8th Destroyer Flotilia consisted of 'CO' Class Destroyers, namely:

Cossack (C)

Constance (C)

Comus (P)

Cockade (D)

Concord (P)

Consort (D)

Charity (from the Med. Fleet).

The navel drafting system in those days still relied upon the troop ship type of transport but, once the Korean War started, HMS Warrier (Light Fleet Carrier) was pressed into service, manned with Reservists who had been called back to serve King and Country by the 'Andrew'. On its first trip to the F.E.S., 'Warrior' supplied the China Station ships with their wartime complement from the three Port Divisions and F.A.A., including 83 replacement aircraft for operational fleet carriers. It was not unusual for neval drafts to be transferred by destroyer or frigate at sea, by jackstay between ships, kits, begs and harmocks following, during the early days of patrois.

Durling the autumn of 1950, 'Cossack' and other vessels of the 8th Destroyer Flotilla provided a screen of protection around HMS Theseus, whilest the latter sent aircraft on flying missions over the Korean Peninsular. The positioning of the screen at sea depended on the 'bombline' ashore. In 1951, the operational carriers included HMS Glory and HMAS Sydney (one operational carrier in the war zone, possibly one in refit in Sydney).

Also Involved in this screen were naval vessels from other nations. The 'Tribal Class' destroyers of the Royal Canadian Navy Included the 'Sloux', 'Heron' and 'Athebesken', with the Royal Australian Navy providing the services of the "Bataan" and "Marramunga" and the Dutch Navy 'Van Galen' (ex-RN). Christmas Day that year was spent at 'Action Stations!'.

During December 1950, 'Cossack' and the 'Belfast', patrolling off the west coast, bombarded enemy targets near Chodo Island, Intended to "rellave pressure" on allied troops at the front line.

'Cossack' provided cover during the landing of RCK Marines, who were dropped behind enemy lines or upon enemy-held Islands to bring back North Korean war criminals alleged to have committed atrocities during the withdrawal of ROK and US troops during the early June/July days of the war. Other duties were assisting the unloading of ROK ships supplying Islands which had been captured or recaptured by South Korean Marines on the west coast.

"Cossack" visited Yokosuka I for Yokohama or Tokyol, Sasebo and Kura, but shore leave at these naval bases was sparse and brief of duration. A reasonably lengthy break in operational duty in Korean waters came when 'Gossack' put In at Tia-Ko dockyard, Hong Kong; yet even during such 'non-operational' respite from the war routine there was the 'odd duty' - such as making a full-speed dash from Hong Kong to Intercept a locally-owned merchant vessel, the SS Nancy Moller, off Helman Island, suspected of being involved in illegal trafficking of rubber, from Malaya to Red China, during May 1951.

September 9 - 24 West coast of Korea. Bombarded Haeju, Choppeki, Choda area and, furthest north bombardment of any UN ship, the Yalu River estuary (echo-sounder run the night · before, for 'Belfast' the following night).

1 - 14 West coast of Korea. October: Bombarded Haeju, Choppeki area, Yalu area. Supported Invasion of Sinmi Do. Fired on by shore batterles. For services rendered - two oxen. 14 Rode out Typhoon Ruth at Sasebo. 17 Sailed for Hong Kong flying 'paying off' pendant.

As shown on the preceding Ship's Chronicle for September 1951, 'Cosseck' steamed north up the west coast of the Chosen Peninsular and carried out an echo-sounding run, up the Yalu River, at night. To add 'spice' to this recipe, 'Cossack', accompanied by 'Belfast', carried out night hombardments of various mainland targets, going up the Yalu River as far north as the 40th Parallel - which is a very long way from home! -"House the Dome!".

"Cosseck' took part in 171 separate bombardments, from the Yalu River on the west coast to Chongjin on the north east coast of the Korean terrain, firing 4,168 rounds of 4.5 Inch shells and 2,400 rounds of Bofors Gun ammunition. One hundred and fifteen transfers of men, ammunition and supplies, as well as thirty refuellings, were made to 'Cossack' at sea.

'Cosseck' - as she was then, the sixth - was laid down by naval architects Vickers Armstrong, at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, on 18 March 1943, Faunched on 10 May 1944 and completed on 4 September 1945. She was commissioned on 22 August 1945.

Standard displacement: 1,730 tons.

Length: 362 feet 9 Inches. Boan: 35 feet 8 Inches. Draught: 15 feet 10 Inches. S.H. P. 40,000 for 33 knots.

Armament consisted of:

4 x 4.5 Inch dual-purpois guns. 6×40 nm Bofors enti-eircraft guns (these replaced the 2 \times 20 mm Gerilkon guns during her short 1950 refit in Hong Kong).

4 x 21 Inch Torpedo Tubes.

Her machinery consisted of Parsons geared turbines (run for ever!). Boilers were Admiralty drum type.

During the Korean War, 'Cossack' steamed 88,000 miles, using fuel to the extent of 19,00 tons. She steamed for 390 days on main engines, during 1950/51; each propeller turned almost 51 million revolutions.

The following is a copy of the original signal to the Commander-in-Chief, Far East Station, from the Admiralty, dated 5 October 1951, on completion of her Commission and prior to her Re-commission in Hong Kong:-

SHE HAS EXPENDED 1500 ROUNDS OF 4.5 INCH AMMUNITION IN DISPERSING TWO PLATOONS OF ENEMY TROOPS, STRAFING OTHERS IN SLIT TRENCHES, DESTROYING TEN BARRACKS, DAMAGING TEN ROAD AND RAIL BRIDGES, RAIL SIDING AND MARSHALLING YARDS, RAIL JUNCTIONS, ROLLING STOCK AND TWO GUN EMPLACEMENTS. ONE SHORE BATTERY WAS SILENCED BY COSSACK'S GUNS AND AMONG THE TARGETS SHE HIT WAS AN TARGETS APART FROM THOSE ON THE WEST COAST WERE WONSAN, SCNGJIN, AND CHONGJIN AREAS ON THE EAST COAST. COSSACK RECENTLY ESCORTED THE REPLENISHMENT CARRIER UNICORN (CAPTAIN J.Y. THOMPSON, R.N.) WHEN SHE RECEIVED TWO OF GLORY'S AIRCRAFT WHICH HAD TO FORCE LAND ON THE ENEMY COAST. THE AIRCRAFT HAD BEEN SKILFULLY LANDED AND REPRESENTED INVALUABLE SALVAGE. ENDS.


ADMIRAL VERNON & THE WASHINGTONS

A body of Americain colonists took part in Admiral Vermon's expedition against Cartagena, in the success of which they were greatly interested. Among them was a certain young officer named Lawrence Washington who enjoyed the special confidence of Admiral Vernon. On the other hand, the Admiral won the admiration and esteem of the young american. Lawerence Washington so strongly believed in the British Navy that he even conceived the idea of procuring for his younger brother (then a boy of eleven) a warrant to enter the King's service, as a midshipman. After Admiral Vermon's return to England in 1743. Lawerence Washington maintained a correspondence with him, and doubtless it was through the Admiral's interest that a midshipman's warrant was actually obtained for the younger Washington in 1746. The boy himself, then fourteen years of age, was eager to enter the King's service, and it was only through his mother's reluctance to part from him that ultimately the idea was abondoned. Thus did it almost come to pass that the illustrious George Washington was on the point of entering the British Navy. Mr. Jackson, a friend of the Washingtons. wrote to Lawrence Washington in the following terms;

"I am afraid Mrs. Washington will not keep up her first resolution. She seems to dislike George's going to sea, and says several persons have told her it was a bad scheme. She offers several trifling objections, such as fond, unthinking mothers habitually suggest; and I find that one word against his going has more weight than ten for it."

However, Mrs. Washington persistently opposed the plan, and it was abandoned. George Washington was not the man to forget Admiral Vermon's services to the American colonies. It was in honour of the British Admiral that his brother Lawrence gave the name of Mount Vermon to the famous estate on the banks of the Potomac River, and Mount Vermon became the home of George Washington himself after he had become the C in C of the American armies and the first President of the United States. It was to Mount Vermon that Washington retired in 1779, at the end of his great public career, and so long as Washington and his home are remembered by the American people - Edward Vermon cannot be forgotten.
