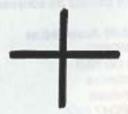

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SMOPS EXTERNAL FEEDBACK TEAM

The External Feedback team was reinitiated in Febuary this year after questionaires sent to the Fleet had failed to evoke a response. The team comprises of WO(R) Ron Toghill and CPO (S) Oscar Wilde to cover the 4 sub branches with additional expertise on call up if required. The aim as laid down in FTM 85/92 is to gather feedback from the sub branches on the effectiveness of SMOPS training of all career courses and PJT's. And to advice Ships on their training organisation, WPE and anything relevant to SMOPS. By collating this information and others from FOSF and FOST it should be possible to tailor the courses to meet the customers requirement I.E. the Fleet.

So far this year 8 ships have been visited with very encouraging results and more are pencilled in for the Autumn term. The team generally make contact with the ship through the ODTC, and this is followed up with a signal to the Ops Officer confirming the date and time. Captain SMOPS will then write to the CO asking for cooperation but stressing that it is an informal visit. The ships comments are answered where possible in SMOPS and the completed report returned to the ship normally within a month. Anything that is outside SMOPS remit will be passed to the unit responsible and an answer extracted. Comments that appear frequently will be forwarded to the relevant TPAG meeting for further discussion and hopefully a solution. The wide ranging comments received so far range from the standard of Seaman Operator joining the Fleet, lack of PJT courses, educational standards and the burden of OJT on ships staff.

TAS JOTTING

Another extremely busy period in the Weapons Section continues (it began, as I recall in 1977 when we spearheaded the move from Vernon to Dryad). Dusty dropped by and gave me the usual old fashioned look that meant he wanted a copy for the SEAMASTER. That was a week ago and I have only just managed to put pen to paper. It's all going to change in the near future I am told "life is going to be easier HO HUM.

STWS 2: The good news: I am told all the front line units have been brought up to date to Version 9 Software. Gerry McGeown's next letter updating your list of CB/BR's ect gives instructions for you to remove the Green Page drills from BR8589 (2) + OSD.

The not so good news: Version 10 Software and Hardware trials took place as per plan, but one or two minor problems came to light which means another delay before they will be released for general use. Cornwall has rejoined the ranks of Version 9 users. The version 10 kit has moved to another ship (not cleared to name her yet) those onboard will be aware of its arrival.

In the last SEAMASTER I advised that the two day conversion course for V10 was to be referenced OSTTTVV - at the time that was correct, would you believe its all been changed. It's still a two day course run at Dryad, but the Course Catalogue Reference number is OSSIOPVV, BR4023 (2) is being amended to comply.

MTLS MASCOT (remember MTLS and Sonar 2050 Control Trainer) sited in the carcass of what was ASUAT 3A received the MTLS Stimulator to time and within cost, as they say. Steve Nash and his IRON DUKES completed their PJT using the first issue of Software. Once this was put under operational stress a few minor snags were highlighted these have been



rectified by the Companyin the form of Issue 2 Software, since then I have been trying to break it, but it is still running 'bug free'. (unlike some other gear that I will not mention because of the Liable Laws)

The V10 update for MTLS is proceeding slowly, as you might expect it awaits a lot of STWS2 trials data before it can forge ahead. As far as the T23 ASW teams are concerned there will be a V10 conversion course for them. As you might imagine it will follow the format used for STW2 ie 2 days, but it is a long way off at the moment. Basically watch this space since I have had access to a fully functioning MTLS system to enable the drills to be checked out, one or two minor errors have been discovered. The next change to BR8342(2) and it's OSD will rectify the situation, that will be at Change 5.

STWS3 I was at Company mid June to finalize the CB04023 information with Gerry McGeown and the Contractors. System 1 and 2 are now crated up ready for delivery with System 3 being set to work. BR 8965 (2) is now at final draft stage ie: ready to go. The BR4023 Series also have the appropriate STWS3 data included in the next change due with you very soon. All being well SMOPS will be in a position to commence training from 1st Jan. '93. PJT dates have been set and will be published through the normal channels.

STING RAY * The conversion program is running as per plan and almost completed. Nearly all of you are now proud owners of the new toy. What happens next I hear you cry. As from Jan 1st you no longer refer to it as STING RAY * , but just plain String Ray. The various Reference publications will be amended in due course to reflect the return to the original title. The removal of Sting Ray (Basic) drills from all the Tube Launched System publications is included in the next changes. As far as the Weapon is concerned trials continue, all I can say here is it goes from strength to strength.

2050 OBT Brian Golding has written a 1 day PJT for this toy. He can be contacted on Dryad 4383, the course Reference number is OSOBTRW, book through TPO Dryad 4320.

MOBY DICK's spy seciel

One of the Cold War's biggest spy riddles has been solvedinside the skeleton of a whale. For five years Britain has accused Russia of stealing hi-tech detection equipment being towed by nuclear submarine Splendid in the icy Barents Sea. But now British scientists studying weather patterns in the Arctic have found remains of the spying gear entangled in the rib cage of a 45-foot humpback whale. Experts said it must have drowned as the weight of the 250-foot long equipment prevented it surfacing for air. In 1987 the crisis caused angry questions in the Commons and denials from the Kremlin. The Defence Milnistry slapped a news blackout on reports that a cat-and-mouse game between Splendid and a shadowing Red submarine ended with the Soviet commander ordering that the tow cable be cut. Sailors on Splendid said they feared the worst when one of Nato's most prized military secrets was severed with "a terrifying roar".

Now it seems that either the Russians did cut the spy gear free, but failed to recover it,or that it parted accidentally. It is unlikely the whale itself caused it to snap. It is probable the humpback was attracted to the equipment by its sonic impulses and became entangled. It was found on Jan Mayen island, hundreds of miles from the encounter between the submarines. A whale as strong as a humpback, capable of swimming 5,000 miles in under 100 days, could have struggled there dragging along the gear, or possibly it drowned within hours, its corpse being swept to Jan M, ayen island by currents.

SIGNATURE REDUCTION AND CONTROL

Having taken over from Neville (Streaky) BACON as the Assistant Surface Flotilla Signature Reduction Control Officer at the end of March I will be continuing to preach the Gospel According to BR 2000 (63). Although the presentation will take a newslant in the future, as I have been directed to present all signatures. Thus giving the ships an awareness toward the importance of "STEALTH" be it IR (INFA RED) RCS (RADAR CROSS SECTION) MAGNETICS and of course our favourite, The ACOUSTIC SIGNATURE (NOISE). The latter being of course covered in more detail than the others. Although RCS is a signature that we must all be aware of and the upkeep of Radar Absorbent Materials is most important because basically the stuff is very expensive.

Presentations are given annually I.A.W. FCD 3 and can be booked by signal, letter or telephone. Signature Reduction and Control is now under the Umberella of the Flag Officer Surface Flotilla. Its responsibilities however, remain the same.

The Surface Flotilla Signature Reduction and Control Unit (SFSRCU) is situated in the offices of FOSF (ME) South Terrace HM Naval Base Portsmouth. (The historic

part of the Dockyard, close to ST.Annes church and near those other stealth Warships 'The Victory' and 'Mary Rose'. We have three teams situated in Portsmouth, Devonport and Rosyth. The teams consist of Mechanical and Electrical

Engineers (The posh name for TIFFS) With a scattering of stokers and one PO (S) SM (Bless him). The SFSRCU's visit Ships and S/Ms at regular intervals (Pre & post refits ect) to inspect for Noise, Shock, Magnetics and RCS. They are know affectionately as the yellow talley brigade. However they are really very very nice people and I trust that you will treat them accordingly.

tealth and Safety: A serious accident occurred by using too thick piece if rubber on a Hatch Stanchion Clip, Make sure the spring loaded clips can asert fully when the hatch is clipped back. The rubber can be enhanced by sing small soft wooden wedges which should be able to be withdrawn easily y hand, By all naval personell. The use of cable ties for securing should be voided.

NEREUS

AD PERFECTIO PROPTER MEDITARI. (TO ATTAIN PERFECTION BY PREPARATION)

The NEREUS trainer, AS 1094- A.F.A.C.T. (Acoustic Frequency Analysis and Classiffication Trainer) was installed in Cook Building HMS Dryad in 1987. (For classical scholars NEREUS is the Greek god of the sea, possessing the gift of prophecy!).

The system comprises a computer based acoustic simulator which generates up to 8 narrowband and 4 broardband targets from a selection of 75 vehicles incorporating submarines, ships, weapons and aircraft. A future target will incorporate a vehicle to represent ST2058/2071 hydrosounders and will be included within an ACT/exercise scenario. This database is constantly being updated and provides realistic targets for display on two facsimile sonars, 2031 and 20311, both of which provide full selection of operator functions. (20311 is due to be removed from NEREUS late 93)

The main aim of NERUS is to provide realistic sonar courses up to Director/coordinator level. The trainer is also used (programe permitting) by ships for Towed Array Team Training, normally prior to Area Capability Training (ACT) or Operational Patrols. The full command i.e. AlO and Sonar teams can operate within NEREUS which provides a realistic scenaroi for up to 30 hours training over a week with one continuous game. NEREUS can also be used for one or two integrated games during Command Team Training. In recent years many FFCH's have used the facilities, most providing two watches to obtain maximum benefit for their largely inexperienced teams.

NEREUS loading for 93/94 is at present 100% with only CMX weeks not used for EQ training. Sept 93 should see the first Operator Mechanic 1 (OM1) course through NEREUS with subsequent courses for OM2,OM3 as required.

With the advent of cross training SHIP WEEK SLOTS have been reduced to a possible one week slot for 93/94. To try ease the situation, equipment at HMS Collingwood is being used for familiarization prior to students using NEREUS for EQ week one and two. This is only a short term solution, Nereus is at the top of the tree (for money) with regards modifications, it is hoped that present 2031 facsimily will be updated by a true system incorporating Tracker, Dicarps and and any on going modifications so as to be totaly representative of systems at sea.

NB: Even though ship week slots at present are few this may change, FOSF are informed immediatly a slot becmes vacant, any ship wishing to use NEREUS should make their bookings through FOSF.

CONTINUATION TRAINING for ratings drafted to the Portsmouth /Portland areas is still available and is closely monitored by CPO (GAPS) Lew Lewis who is constantly in touch with Centurion and JAAC as to the whereabouts of ratings within the area. It may be prudent at this stage to remind DO's, CHOPS (S) and the ratings themselves that it is mandatory for Passive sonar rates to remain in date with continuation training no matter what the situation. We have had instances where a lad was 12 months out of date and only working in the Dockyard, when his boss was notified, training was negotiated so that on his return to sea he was in date and current with changes to drills ect.

XSV01 Probes are being phased out of service and will soon no-longer be available from Copenacre.

It is expected that a new Bathy System will be brought into service before he end of the year. It will use the same Probes and Launchers in use at the noment BUT both MK2 and MK8 recorders will be compatible stand-alone nicro-processor unit. It is expected that this will be able to perform all the asks which previously were covered by both MK2 and MK8 recorders, with be additional ability to interface directly with XBT,XSV and XCTD* robes. Display and record probe data. Decimate, analyse, merge with limatilogical data and edit profiles thus eliminating the self-analysis of rofiles and NP690. All probe acounting will also be executed on the system s well as signal message generation.

XCTD probes measure not only temperature but density of the water as ell thus giving more accurate Sound Speed Information.

he latest Taunton XBT newsletter (March 92) gave a list of valid and walid weather/cloud combinations and wave period /height combinations of the top line of the bathy log. Having spoken to Taunton at length about ese parameters the operator should take them as a guideline only. However your combinations do not fit into the guidelines a note should be made in a remarks column of the bathy log.

to have had various reports of the standard of Seaman Sonars at sea with spect to them taking bathy dips and recording the information. It is applicated that the training objectives for these ratings are achieved, this is rither consolidated by them taking and passing an exam on analysing and ding the bathy traces into NP690. However this is carried out week one of hir course and it is felt that the problem arises from lack of retention on hir part. This could be overcome with on job training.

Preparations for this years event got underway, in embrionic form, after last years event. Preparations began in earnest in February, and as everyone can appreciate, the main problem was how far we were going to ride this year after the previous cycle rides of 180 miles in 1989/90 and 472 miles in 1991. Then someone had the bright idea of touching the borders of Wales and Scotland in a "Round Britian Cycle Ride", that blame lies with WO (OPS)(S) Steve Will and CPO(OPS)(S) Dusty Rhodes.

As the event was due to take place during a Cook Maintenance Week, the next phase was to find out who could be spared to take part, the most important of these being the riders. we started out with WO(OPS)(S) 's Robin (Dave) Hood, Steve Will, Dave Brotherwood, Steve Rodgers, CPO Dusty Rhodes, PO's Bobby Ball, Roy Flint and last but not least Mr. John Walker. Unfortunately, due to service commitments on joining FOSF's team in the Dockyard, Steve Rodgers had to pull out, leaving us with seven riders.

Next we asked for volunteer drivers, CPO's Andy Gleave and Tom Stevens came forward, with Ian Laurie joining us nearer the date. Finally the support team in Dryad consisted of CPO's Dickie Drew, Tex Marshall and PO Bomber Mills.

Now the team members were all given specific tasks to organise, such as A.S.W.I.'s plaques, T shirts, first aid bags, radio sets, transport, fuel, fruit, drinks mutty ect. and accommodation at the various overnight resting points. Everything was taken care of well in advance, and we were all set to leave Dryad at 0815 on Monday 11th May.

Team "A" consisted of Steve Will, John Walker and the Land Rover driven by Andy Gleave. Team "B" were Robin Hood, Dave Brotherhood and Dusty Rhodes supported by the Dryad welfare mini bus driven by Ian Laurie, Team "C" was made up of Bobby Ball and Roy Flint, with the British Lions of Waterlooville mini bus driven by Tom Stevens.

All the teams mustered at 0730 at the A.S.W.I.'s portacabin, checked and packed their gear into the vehicles and set off for a quick circuit of Dryad, then stopped at the main gate to be officially started on the 820 miles trip by Cdr "U" ably assisted by two nurses from the chilrens ward at Q.A. Hospital at 0815. All riders and support vehicles set off down the main drive to the cheers from both families and friends, Team a were to complete the first leg of 18 miles to Fishers Pond Pub, whilst Teams B and C got into their vehicles to get to their starting points.

On the first day, the teams covered 208 miles in total, having an E.T.A. at Clive Barracks of 1800. A.T.A. was 1820, which was very good going for the first days ride.

Only a few minor problems were encountered that day. Dave Brotherwood had a slow puncture, which got steadily worse, until he called in the maintenance team.

The morale of all the teams was very high, especially after being looked after so well by the WO and Sgts Mess of the 1st Battalion, Black Watch, to whom we presented a commemorative plaque.

DAY 2: Started with a huge breakfast, leaving Clive Barracks at 0700, hoping to cover a distance of 215 miles by 215. The day was dull and overcast with drizzle turning to rain for the first hour, with a good wind that continued to blow all day, Bobby and Roy were actually blown up the Shap, which is one of the highest hills in the Lake District. During the day all teams were improving both their times and techniques, Dusty struggled uphill due to having smaller wheels on his bike, he will have to borrow his sons bigger bike in future. Dusty also had to replace an inner tube after it had burst, probably due to heat expansion of the air whilst speeding down hill.

After blowing his tyre yesterday, Bobby Ball thought that he would try using only one pedal, as the other crank had come loose, needless to say that it did not get him very far, at least it was soon repaired.

We finally arrived in Hawick at 1820,20 mins behind our E.T.A., after riding over some of those hills it was understandable. Once again we were very well received by Hawick Legion, who fed and "watered" us. We were also invited to join the ladies in the function room, where they were celebrating theBattle of Culloden, which took place way back in 1746, when the Duke of Cumberland defeated the Young Pretender, thus crushing the Jacobite Rebellion. The ladies, by the way, were all pensioners, the only member of our team who was entitled to join them was John Walker, who has now retired from active service with the R.N.

Steve Will and Roy Flint won a prize in the raffle, a can of Tennants and a packet of bourbon biscuits respectively, Roy, being the diplomat, was heard to say "Thats another one for Culloden".

After that we were taken to our resting place for the night, which was a Duke of Edinburghs award hostel at Craigshill, some 30 miles outside Hawick, a very comfortable night was spent by all, especially after a night cap of scotch, supplied by Mr. Andrew Forsth, who arranged for us to stay at the hostel.

DAY 3: Started at 0600 with breakfast cooked by Andrew, then we travelled back to Hawick to pick up the bikes and vehicles, that we had left at the Police station for safe keeping, and started the next stage to York at 0700 Team "A" had a punishing first leg, some 14 miles almost continually climbing over the Cheviot Hills, it took them 1hour 20 mins, then Team "B" took over with a downhill run for 6 miles, plus 2 miles flat, and only minor hills for the rest of their leg. All teams once again progressed very well, arriving in York well ahead of E.T.A. of 1800, at 1550.

Just outside York, Tom Stevens played white knight to a young lady whos mini had an overheating problem, (no water), whilst waiting for the engine to cool down, so it could be refilled, Tom shared some cigarettes with her, consequently. Bobby only had two left by the time he turned up. Morale was still high, with Bobby and John suffering from saddle rub.

We found York T.S. (Sea Cadet Unit), and just as the Land Rover was being parked, the gearbox decided to give up the ghost, and refused to come out of reverse, we latter found out that it was the fault of a nylon bush on the end of the gear stick. A quick running repair later proved to be unsuccessful, all that was left until the morning, when we could get in touch with 41 Repair Workshop at Strensall 12 miles North East of York.

Once again we were very well looked after by York T.S. the evening meal was big to say the least, and very tasty, the breakfast was enormous.

DAY 4: The penultimate day, found us, fed and on the road by 0700, unfortunately, as we were driving out of the car park, the Land Rover finally gave up, and refused to go into gear, so all the teams crammed their gear and cycles into the two mini buses, which was quite a squeeze, so Tom and Ian had the three teams to look after.

I waited at York T.S. for the Land Rover to be picked up and taken for repair at Strensall. Once we arrived at the REME workshop, it took one and a quarter hours to get back on the road at 1145, then high tail it after the teams and try to catch them up before they reached Northampton some 153 miles away. I did catch them up with the teams on the outskirts of the city, so at least we were all together to enter the city, and get to the Sea Cadet hut, where we would spend the night. We were met by Mr. Mike Tilby, who took us to his house for a wash, brush up and evening meal, which was cooked by his wife, so they had ten ravenous but clean people to feed. Then it was off to the R.N. and R.M. Association for "Watering".

Morale was still very high, as could be expected with the good weather that had accompanied us over the last two days, all the teams were raring to go for the last stage of this well worthwhile and enjoyable charity cycle ride of 1992.

DAY 5: 0600 Saw us all on the road for the last stage, it was raining slightly, but it did not dampen our spirits, or last very long. We were making very good time, the legs seemed to fly by, and we started the last leg from Fishers Pond to Dryad at 1040, Tean "A" completed that leg by 1120 and we waited at the Golden Lion car park to assemble all the riders and vehicles, for the entry into Dryad. Things had not gone too well for Team "c", their expected leg of 15 miles had actually worked out to be 22.5 miles. There had also been a miscalculation over the last stage, a leg of 15 miles, between Sutton Scotney and Fishers Pond, had been ommitted from the route instructions, consequently, Team "B" jumped in to save the day, so they were the last to arrive at the car park at 1150. A quick brush up and we all set off up the drive to the main gate, with Robin Hood breaking the tape at 1200.

We were welcomed by Captain "T", The Cdr, 1st Lt, Nurses from Q.A., M.N.D. Portsmouth, Staff Officers, WO's Instructors and courses from the "U" Department, Families and friends of the teams.

After a short photo call, it was off to the reception, where all the root was prepared and very nicely presented, by Mrs. Jean Hood and Mrs. Val Allen. Thankyou.

Finally, a hig THANKYOU to all who took part in this worthwhile, and on my part enjoyable event, giving up their time to train for the 820 mile jaunt around the country. Thankyou to Wives and Girlfriends for supporting us. Thankyou to everyone who gave generously, and for those that did't, we'll

catch you next year.

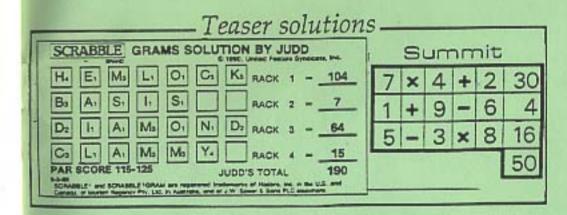
