


TREASURERS REPORT



So you may find a FAA man carrying out post-analysis on a Leander's patrol, AFFTA man on an SSN job and a submariner on a Type 22.

Hence the "joint" bit is coming back into the name JAAC; we also liaise with the MPA Communities if there is any overlap.

The aim now is to "turn round" a patrol within 6 weeks of receiving it and send it back th the ship, albeit much briefer on the acoustics side, but actually in time for it to be read by the blokes who went and carried it out in the first place.

Rest of the World/Chance Encounters ext 2221 CPO Chris Briers TBRB Taff Thomas.

This team of four Senior Rates deals mainly (but not exclusively) with what can be best described as anything and everything that isn't what your average FFTA normally gets tasked against. Chris also has access to other agencies so has a good feel for trends, who's doing what and where, etc. So he tends to get his brains severely picked before someone goes to deliver a Pre-Patrol Briefing. FELLOW MEMBERS

Firstly I apologise for missing the Association AGM but as I explained I was suffering a little with TAS back! I was confident however, that Dave Williams would fly the FOST flag high and that you would receive him with your normal enthusiasm. Secondly both the Chairman and the Editor have repeatedly asked me for a dit from us FOSTIES and as I leave late April I thought I had better make a determined effort. (incidently WO Greg O'SULLIVAN takes the helm).

Before I attempt my dit may I take this opportunity to pass the thanks of all FOSTIES to Steve Will for his efforts and time during a difficult period as Chairman. Furthermore our congratulations to Dave Hood on his election as Chairman, he can be assured of the full support of the Portland Team.

QUESTION; What piece of equipment is used by all sonar fitted ships whilst in the Portland Areas?

ANSWER: The TRIPLANE. (Bearing 125 "A" Head at 4.5nm)

THE TRIPLANE TARGET

- The triplane target at Portland is only one of three situated around the South Coast of England. It is a cheap, robust and easily maintained piece of equipment requiring no power supplies. It is used as a confidence check to prove the effectiveness and alignment of all our present Active Sonars.
- 2. Designed in the early sixties for use with the now obsolete sonar 177, its features and configuration however, make it just as effective with with our present sonars 184. 2016 and believe it or not 2050. The complexities of the later sonar however, and its use against the triplane has raised interesting questions from some ASWD's, and both FOF1 and FOST staffs continue to monitor and evaluate ships performances against the target and as yet have found no conclusive evidence to doubt the triplane as a useful target for checking effectiveness and alignment of 2050. (software changes may have some effect in the future).

- 3. The Target represents a small conventional submarine, bow aspect, with a target strength in excess of 7db's. Its inovative design ensures that tidal effects in its shallow mooring and target aspect do not alter with the ships relative positioning. A four element system of triangular corner reflectors is utilised, they are carefully rotated to ensure a balanced 360 deg coverage in its polar diagram. The only obvious shortcoming with the triplane is the shallow water reverberation limits imposed when mooring the system in depths of only 13 30 meters
- 4. The complete unit at Portland is removed and overhauled annually by dockyard mooring and salvage staff. The four foot square, three quarter inch steel plate is cleaned, inspected, prepared and recoated with anti-fouling paint.


Senior members will be aware that there used to be four on the South Coast, Portland, Falmouth and Devonport.



TAS JOTTINGS



It was just another pile of paper work across the desk, nothing odd about that. Among the signals, suggested drill changes and classified packs were the latest FTM's. Tucked among the FTM's I came across 8/92. The first two lines "HMS Ariadne will reduce to the disposal list in April 1992" jumped out of the page. Over the years I have noticed the rise and fall of various items of ASW Weaponary, this FTM contained an unwritten message - The end of sonar type 170 and Mortar Mk 10 - MCS 10 -. In our branch whole groups of people have grown up with MSC 10 with its basic principle of short range attack sonar linked to its own weapon. Its lineage going back to 144/Hedgehog through 164/Squid the ahead thrown Weapon ending up with the Rolls Royce of all ATW -MCS 10 - . I can recall as though it were only yesterday trying to raise the interest of a class of UC Basics in the delights of 170 Bearing Recorder theory followed by Range Recorder broken down procedure etc. Gentlemen we are at the end of a major era in RN ASW. Enough of the tears, back to the hard realities of life.

STWS 2 I had a pleasent pair of days in Cornwall recently updating Mac and Rick to version 10 software, ready for sea trials. Both the ASWD's and Warfare Officers seemed to take to the update. We now await their findings at the trials. If all goes well software version 10 will find its way into the fleet in about 18 months time. Make a note of the SMOPC two day conversion course - OSTTTVVV - and get onto TPO Dryad (4320) as soon as you have a clear idea of fitting dates. Details will also be laid down in BR 4023 (2) at the next change.

MTLS The MASCOT trainer in ASUAT 3A is about to receive a new peice of kit, a simulator for the MTLS system. Basically once fitted it will be possible to put targets into the system and drive the ship around, as you have grown used to with STWS2 in ASUAT 6. All this done by a PC - Magic !!!! I am hopeful that the IRON DUKE team will have it available for their PJT. The updates of MTLS to version 10 software has commenced, naturally it will speed up once the Sea Trials With STWS2 have been completed.

STWS3 This system is proceeding towards installation at a steady rate. The first system has completed trials including numerous firings from the tubes. It should be 'crated up' and waiting for a lucky T42 later this year. Course details will be

contained in BR 4023 (2) at the next change. Capabilities and limitations will appear at the next change to CB 04023

STING RAY Make sure you read and understand FOTI 0814, especially the items on the last page. Any queries give me a bell. Hopefully 0813 will be re-written in the middle of this year to bring it up to date. Not before time I hear you cry !!!

CPO(OPS)(S) Pordage Training Design (TD3) Oliver Block HMS Dryad

Going back to good old HMS VERNON. Most of us only knew the place as a fine "tightly - knit" Training Establishment which was ideally situated.

"But who was VERNON"

EDWARD VERNON (1684 - 1757)

Vernon was born in Westminster, London, and entered the Navy in 1700 as a volunteer on board the SHREWSBURY, flagship of Sir George Rooke. He was promoted Lieutenant two years later and appointed to the BARFLUER, flagship of Sir Clowdisley Shovel, being present at the capture of Gibraltar in 1704 and at the subsequent battle of Velez Malaga. He became a post Captain in 1706, serving in various commands at sea untill the end of the War of the Spanish Succession (1702 - 13), and then came ashore.

He was elected to parliament in 1722 and took a prominent part in all naval debates, becoming a strong supporter of another war against Spain on account of the cruelties of the Spanish guarda - costas against British Merchant seamen in the West Indies. The case of Captain Jenkins, who was reputed to have had an ear cut off by the guarda - costa, was strongly supported by him, in which, forced a reluctant British Government to declare war against Spain in 1739.

As a result of a boastful speach in parliament, he was given command of a squadron of only six ships with instructions "to destroy the Spanish settlements in the West Indies and distress their shipping by every method whatever". It was hoped by the government that, with so tiny a force, VERNON would inevitably fail to achieve anything and thus be held up to ridicule, but he took his ships to the Spanish stronghold of PORTO BELLO, captured the fort which guarded the entrance almost without loss, seized the town, and held it to ransom after destroying all war stores. The capture of Porto Bello aroused such enthusiasm in Britain that there was no course left open to the government but to send him a considerable reinforcement in ships and men for further operations against Spanish possessions.

His next operation was an attempt to to capture the great port of CARTAGENA by an amphibious attack in 1741. This proved to be a disaster, partly because of an

apidemic of yellow fever which ravaged both crews of the ships and the soldiers ashore, but mainly because of the lack of initiative shown by the army commander, Major General Wentworth, who refused to allow his men to advance against the town untill all neighbouring forts had been silenced. Even after this had been done by parties of seamen landed by ships, the parties of soldiers remained inactive. VERNON and WENTWORTH were not even on speaking terms, a fact which Boded ill for an operation of this nature which called for combined Naval and military tactics to achieve success. The attack on Cartagena had to be abandoned amid the vitriolic (good word) quarrels of the two leaders with nothing to show for it beyond a very heavy loss of life from disease. Tobias Sollett was serving in the fleet as a surgeon's mate at Cartagena, and in his novel RODERICK RANDOM, has left a vivid picture of conditions on board the British fleet.

VERNON was promoted to Admiral in 1745 and appointed to command the North Sea Fleet. He was responsible for stopping supplies from France destined to nourish the attempt of Prince Charles Edward to regain the throne of Britain for the deposed Stuart line of Kings. This was his last operational command, as he asked to be relieved when the Admiralty refused to grant him the status of a Commander in Chief. During the following year his name was removed from the list of flag officers as a result of the publication of a number of annoymous pamphlets highly critical of the Admiralty which, although he denied authership, were known to have been written by him.

VERNON was a man of intemperate speach which made him many enemies, but for his time he was a most enlightened and far-seeing naval officer. He was one of the first Admirals to practice his Captains in naval manouevers and their ships companies in gun drills. He also issued a number of additional instructions, for use in his fleet, to the official FIGHTING INSTRUCTIONS, by means of which he was able to produce an added flexability in landing his fleet in battle. The majority of these additional instructions were accepted and added to by all subsequent naval commanders of the British Fleets.

Some of you, no doubt, will rember his Knick Name "OLD GROG" on account of the grogram boatcloak, or, according to some, breeches which he always wore on board. It was he who, in 1740, issued an order that the daily ration of Rum issued to the seamen of the fleet ship was to be watered down in the proportion of three parts water to one part rum, and since that day watered down rum has always been called "Grog" (for those of you who did not know that already).
