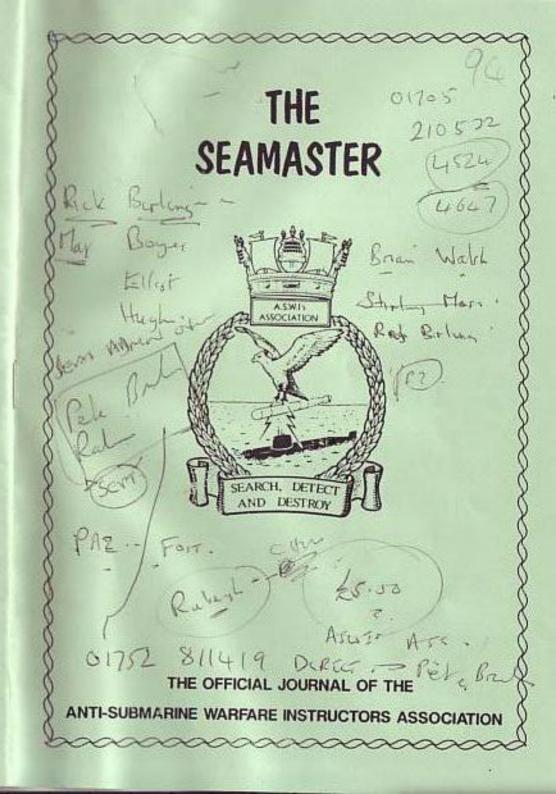

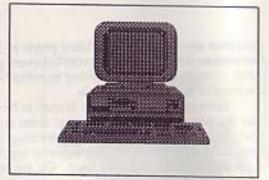

ASW USER OPERATIONAL PUBLICATIONS: SIX MONTHLY UPDATE

- Greetings to all ASW personnel everywhere. Here again is the six monthly update on ASW publications.
- Llangennech update. Mega problems continue within the distribution centre, including ships receiving changes out of sequence (5 but no 4 and 3); Non-issue of binders with issue of new books and so it goes on. I will continue to pressure them, on your behalf, but I am not hopeful of any early improvement in the organisation.
- The following publication changes have taken place during the past six months and are in the pipe-line for the second half of 1994.
 - a. Sonar 2008/9. The information formally contain in FOTI's is now in BR 4023 (change 5) as Chapter 7 to part 1.
 - b. STWS/MTLS Edition 10: Trials are scheduled for late 1994. 1995 still looks a good bet for Fleet fitting programme.
 - c. Sonar 2031: Procedures are now in BR 8713(OP)-A5 size and CB 08713(1,2B) Vol 1. Vol 2 of CB 08713(1,2B) should be returned to your CBO.
 - d. Sonar 182: Change 6 to BR 4023(2)(due in the Fleet in early Autumn) contains updated procedures for 182 Streaming/Recovery. Procedures are laid out for each specific class of ship.
 - e. Sonar 2050: New CB & BR recently issued with both books in A5 size as requested by the 1993 Active Sonar Drill Meeting. Comments on the usage of the A5 size book, particularly the CB, would be appreciated.

CHANGE OF ACCOUNT NAME

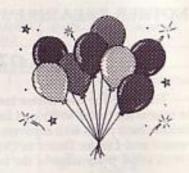

NRV ALLIANCE - LFA

Well, as promised by your Ed, here is my dit on LFA and my time at sea on NRV ALLIANCE. (NRV = NATO Research Vessel)

NRV ALLIANCE is the only ship that is owned entirely by NATO. It is operated and based at SACLANTCEN La Spezia Italy. She is built to civilian standards and is manned (No women) by a Multi-national crew consisting of a German Master and mate, British Officers and Italian crew. The Scientific community is split between German, Italian, American, British, Belgium and French teams.

The ship is 93m long with a gross tonnage of 3180. Her max speed is around 16Kts, The accommodation is all en-suite cabins and they serve

free Red wine with all meals (best bit...Ed).

Anyway, I joined her in Falmouth and had a great run ashore...I think...We sailed the next day and the first thing that struck me was the complete absence of noise. This was an extremely quiet ship, so much

so, that I found it difficult getting to sleep....honest.

Exercise Resolute Response - a large NATO exercise conducted in the South West Approaches - was our destination, we were to research and evaluate the operation of the NATO experimental version of a Low Frequency Active Sonar under as realistic conditions as possible, to this end I think it was a success...It got rough...I got seasick..That was pretty realistic! Anyway I'm sure you can understand I cannot go into great detail about the system itself but I will say that it operates at a frequency lower that any of us has worked with before. We made detections at a greater range than has been achieved by any sonar set we have operated before and this system has the potential to give us the lead again, against all classes of submarine anywhere in the world. A lot of work has yet to be conducted but I believe that this is where our future lies.

The biggest problem that I encountered was the fact that the Menu's were in Italian and the steward's command of the English language was as polished as my Italian!....I spent the first three days eating Pasta with fish sauce on it because that was the only item I could recognize. However, after three weeks the improvement was so vast that I can now enter any Italian restaurant with confidence and order Insalta

Verdi (Lettuce) and still get Pasta!

The training Commander told me to sit in a lecture being given by a candidate for the rate of instructor. the students were young sonar operators and the subject was the propagation of sound in water. Dear All

Well, I was uncertain what to title this offering and on second thoughts wondered did it need a title, leave that up to the readers to provide their own! First I must make it clear that I am not in contention for a Lampswinger Award, just hope to revive a few memories of a while ago down in deepest Dorset at a place called HMS Osprey, the same venue as the present of that name, but things were a little different then. Can you imagine NO airfield, NO regular transport runs, Q pier was something of a very modern addition to the dockyard, also the most modern of vessels to be seen was 'Undaunted' one of the early conversions to the Type 15 class in the fleet, and guess what, rumour had it, that a Helicopter could actually land onto the after deck, well that was the Buzz at the time.

If your memory says yes to any of these, then you will have been a member of the Training Team or perhaps passing through on a Course. So to set the scene, what went on in the area at the time then, bearing in mind that FOST and all the operations concerned with that

set up were only in the dream stage.

The key to the whole set up was really the Ships and Staff of the '2nd Training Flotilla/Squadron' it was on these, that Classes were taken to sea to Exercise with 'Live' Submarines as part of the courses that commenced in Vernon. These ranged from 3rd Class Rates up to

TAS Long Course.

Accommodation was provided in 'Osprey' as were the lecture rooms, ATH's, Surface Craft House, etc, the area itself wasn't always everyone's choice of draft, though I must admit to being one of the volunteers, the times that I spent there with such Oppo's in the PO's mess as Shorty Mason, Norman Shouls, Jim Curtis, George Elgie, Tanzy Lee (Whatever happened to Bertha?), Ben Ashton, who along with myself were the only two 1st Class Rates on Instructional Duties and of course not in receipt of the whole 1/- a day Instructors Pay, always a good Tot Time debate. Jack Phillips, Barry Spencer - whose wife was expecting their first baby- Barr announcing that if a boy he was to be christened Markson! Thankfully they had a girl. We were all looked after by the mess President, Tubby Buxton, better known to his friends as Fangio, after the Formula 1 racing driver of that time, this was due to Tubby and his Wash Up on Monday as to how long it took him on his drive home each weekend.

I can remember well on one occasion, he was very concerned that the 'Old Girl' wasn't pulling at all well, not surprising after we found a large amount of Portland Stone in his boot, heavens, who would do that, we all thought!

Another name at the time was Tom Bowler, he lived in the Married Quarters in Walker Crescent, a little story relating to him happened one night when I was duty PO/Instructor and on the receipt of the Submiss signal Lower Deck was cleared and people detailed to proceed to and back up Ship's Companies of vessels in Harbour, during the organisation of this I put forward a bid for anyone with wheels to go to Walker Crescent knock on every door in order to get Senior Rates back onboard, Tom was one of those, and after the panic asked me who was the So and So I had sent, having had the experience of coming through Portland Square and the Driver leaving the wheel to close a door that had flung open, with apologies for the bad catch, the punch line was that the Driver didn't have a licence anyway, never mind it was an emergency, thankfully not to become a Subsunk, I think Tom forgave me!

On arrival in Osprey part of the joining routine was the good old kit muster, this was done by the Course Officer. Such names come to mind as Mr Saunders, Marchant, Andrews, not to forget SHUTE, well who could! All these were of course 'Commissioned Gunners' and with the coming of the SD Officer overnight they became Sub Lt

accordingly.

Getting back to Taff Shute, I had the luck to be with him for several classes, I remember one in particular when on the FIRST occasion of meeting the class as they laid out their kit for inspection in the dormitory, in he came, "PO"..."Yes Sir" .. "Is it Stand Easy"..."Negative Sir"..."Right, All the men smoking on a charge, understand. I am the OOD, and will see them". Phew what could you say? at least they all passed the Course, though I don't think that was one of the End of the course runs ashore the Class Officer was invited

Another part of the joining routine was Audiology Test in the Trailer, remember Cock Heron the Audiologist? No matter what Rank

or Age you were, to him you were always Laddie.

Getting back to the mention of Helicopters, we had Two of the first Aircrew in the School. Jan Maunder, and Harry Tate, the latter was a Towney of mine, and we were often seen on our Motorcycles, one Sunday night I met Harry under the bridge at the foot of the hill to the main gate, some choice language as his chain had broken so it meant a push up of his 650cc machine.

He tried to encourage many to volunteer for Aircrew, which of course was a Magic Area in those days, navigating by Railway lines etc was the norm. There was a very small Chopper ATH which we were allowed to see in Operation nearing the end of courses under the

future Development umbrella.

Getting back to the lack of transport, classes were expected to march from the rear of the Admin block to their ships in the yard and repeat the trip at night, no matter the weather. Anyway the PO's Mess being situated as it was - with a Panoramic view of ships entering and leaving harbour - meant that as a Victualled member, you were always assured your beverage would be ready for you on your return to the Mess, by kind permission of your Mess mates, who would identify what ship and class aboard. With the help of Big Betty behind the bar who would leave the final bolt until the very last minute, often with the bribe of a lift home as her last bus had left.

On the Training side, one of the big events after morning divisions was the march to Lecture Hall where classes listened to 78rpm records to test their skills in H.E. torpedo, diesel, steam recip etc, etc, also the all important Morse, I think senior classes were expected to achieve a standard of 8 words a minute, all very much needed in those days before U/W telephone, the only way to Communicate apart from Charge Signals to the submarine was by using the hand key, having turned down your set to, I think, 10 K/C or was it 8 K/C, and off you went... Your position PBL.....Or send THREE DOGS, yes that is correct, we had no DELTA's in those days !!

Whilst talking on the subject of signals, it was during my trips to Portland that I remember the use of two in particular, the first was the RED grenade, for which the lookouts were always told the importance of, well, having dived SELENE on a CASEX suddenly there it was, a RED grenade, and I am sure to this day that the boat almost beat the grenade to the surface, the reason we were to learn was an injury to a member of the Engine Room, he was transferred by Seaboat and landed ashore.

The second was a far more serious event. I was at sea aboard FLINT CASTLE the day SUBSUNK was signalled involving HMS AFFRAY, all the stops were pulled out as you can imagine, and it was during the search that a detection was made firm enough to initiate the dropping of TWELVE CHARGES, alas after a long pause and complete silence, it was difficult to describe, nothing was sited. This event was brought home more in a way to all TAS personnel I am

certain by the fact that amongst the victims of that loss was the son of the Captain of HMS VERNON at the time.

I remember during the search that ships fitted with Type 162

(COCKCHAFER) proved that system.

On a more social note, who remembers the 'PORTLAND FLIER' not actually a BR Special to say the least, instead a train, which used to run from Weymouth after the last bus had departed - destination Portland - Victoria Square, this was the nearest thing to being Jackproof that was ever constructed. It's carriages had no doors, light fittings, windows etc, and used to chugg across the stretch to the distant sounds of Matelots singing their hearts out after a good run, bearing in mind that on arrival they still had to complete the journey by foot.

Knight was another of the characters of the Osprey scene known to his flock as 'The Bish', it was not unusual to see him in the Mess at Tot Time ticking off, and of course not known to refuse sippers, or even challenge Twice Around the Board for your Tot, as he produced the famous Crib Board. He was a great hit with the lads as well, often in the Dogs in the Dormitories, anything from Rug Making, Monopoly, etc, even to the fine art of Lost Contact Procedure.

One item fails me, that is the SANGAMO in the Dockyard, I can remember taking classes there and have a hazy idea it was some form

of Super Attack Teacher, can anybody help?

Part of the course at Portland involved operating aboard S.D.B. against X-craft in Weymouth Bay, remembering on gaining a contact first thing to do was to find out which face of the transducer it came from, as the sets transmitted from both sides, we were also expected to operate Port Defence Asdic's. Guess in a way we were quite experienced cookies!

As for the main Sea operating as I mentioned earlier, we used ships of the 2nd TS, ranging from the workhorses in the guise of Castle Class Corvettes/Frigates, LEEDS, OAKHAM, HEADINGHAM and TINTAGLE. These although good sea boats, were not always favourite on a Friday returning from the Exercise Area with the steam recip nursed by the Chief Tiff giving everything it had, much better to see your class was aboard UNDAUNTED, ZEST, MYNGS, ZEPHYR. Then you stood better chance of your Friday starting nearer time. Of course during the space of time, these craft were to be relieved by such names as DUNDAS, GRAFTEN, KEPPLE, HARDY, BLACKWOOD and PELLEW. Yes the Type 14 was on the scene, with of course, updated equipment. I remember one member of a class I

had, who actually found these vessels had ashtrays that slid under the table when housed, and not all over the place in a drop of seaway, big deal!

Gone were the days of submarines towing BUFFS for the lookouts to keep sight of, and certain S/LT's to return to a boat after they had been severed, when we got back to harbour. Another lighter note was heard when a Subs Class onboard a Castle Class - all members being budding Capt Walker's - having changed round, the order, Slow ahead both engines was given from the bridge, back came the reply up the voicepipe "we've only got one Sir". Then quick as a flash came "Roger Stop Starboard!"

Well I think this dit has gone on far enough, I did warn the Editor that I would try and put a few words together, (about 1,543 to be exact.....Ed) my word they have brought back some Very Happy Memories, and I must add that until only recently, I have been able to keep in touch with the Navy at that end of the world, also the Hostelries by virtue of the fact of being a member of the R.N.X.S.and manning PORTLAND PHQ for many exercises. Sadly we are now redundant like so many other things, so I feel that my many years around there are now at an end worse luck.

Lets finish on a personal laugh. My wife was expecting our first baby, she had been admitted to Portwey Maternity Hospital and I was about to go off on a Long Day at sea with a class, a quick phone call before I joined the ship. "Yes your wife has had her baby, both are doing very well"..."Thank you Sister... Was it a boy or a girl?"... "You'll see when you come to visit her"..."But Sister I am off to sea now until around 2200 tonight"..."Very well, no problem, I will leave a message with the night Staff to allow you to visit"..."But Sister, it's only 7am now, can't you please tell me?"..."Sorry, it's Hospital Rules no further information on the telephone until Father has visited"....

Well, off I went, no need to say how I was feeling, very Happy, yes, but also very confused to say the least, on arrival aboard, I just had to spread the Good News, but how do you explain to a bunch of Matelots you don't know the sex of your child, imagine, as I'm sure you can, the many suggestions and advice I was given!! I think that was the Longest Day for me. I did however manage to visit my wife and DAUGHTER on return, although it was way past Pipe Down.
