

CPO TASI Norman Shouls Eulogy

Born 03 June 1925 to Kate & Norman in Nottingham.

Oldest son of 7 children, very fond of his Uncle 'Captain Jack', he helped his parents support the family from an early age by delivering groceries and papers by bicycle. He did well at School and when he finished he went forward as an apprentice at a local factory, but ran away to join the Navy. He began his active service at HMS Collingwood on the 12 May 1943 and was torpedoed twice on the North Atlantic convoy. Losing many friends and shipmates to the sea.

He was very reserved when it came to women. He met his first and only girlfriend, Joan a WREN, who was to become the love of his life and wife of 60 years in the NAAFI. Their courting began with a rather amusing start after Norman asked a close friend to ask Joan out for him. Joan turned to said friend and said 'if he wants to go out with me he will have to ask me himself'. Needless to say he did.

When first dating Joan as an Able seaman, Norman was standing to attention on deck as is the norm for the ship leaving port, when the Captain spied a young attractive woman waving enthusiastically from the quayside. The Captain demanded 'Whose young woman is that?' Norman was immediately ratted on by his fellow sea mates. Much to Normans embarrassment the Captain ordered him to fall out and wave back, this became standard procedure every time this ship left port with Joan becoming infamous as Norman's stunning and much loved girlfriend.

Following a successful period of courting. Norman asked Joan to marry him on South Sea sea front, she told him he would have to ask her father's permission. In an attempt to win favour with his potential father-in-law Norman spent the whole of a very hot and nerve wracking afternoon helping dig his allotment, the tension was finally broken when Joan's father turned round and asked "Haven't you got something to ask me lad?" Norman and Joan were married on his birthday 03 June 1949 at St Botolph Church Hume

Sussex. Once married Norman again shared another amusing moment this his now, teetotal may I add, father in law, who visibly concerned asked 'are you taking my daughter into a public house?' In true Norman fashion he replied "Well I am certainly not going to leave her outside am I?'

Norman loved the life at sea and was in the Navy for 27 years - a lecturer at Dartmouth College, a Torpedo And Submarine Instructor and Chief Petty Officer. He trained cadets and future Naval Officers from many different Commonwealth Countries in all aspects of naval warfare.

After the Navy he continued his love of the sea by joining HM coastguards on 22/06/1970. Starting at East Prawle, Devon, moving on to the training School in Brixham and ending up as District Controller in Aberdeen, where he did such a good job they asked him to come to Southampton to re-organise the Solent Service. He even extended his retirement date to October 1987 to complete the task and was awarded the MBE for services to HM Coastguards which he collected from the Queen on 8th December 1987.

He was a keen amateur carpenter and vegetable gardener and shared his eldest daughter Maggie's love of reading, crosswords and The Archers. He always completed the daily crossword.

His all male working environment was contrasted by having the challenge of helping Joan to raise four loving daughters, Maggie, Bobby, Liz and Jules. In later life him and Joan became proud grandparents to Mike, Skye, Mark and Boady.

The death of Joan on 31 December 2010 shook his existence to the core. In true Norman Shouls fashion he remained stoically independent supported by very good neighbours and friends. Joan's cooking becoming replaced by a daily meal with his surrogate family at the Nelson.

In his own words' After Joan's death I have been on a Foreign commission which I just wish would end'. That end has now come; they are Home together.

Schoolyard Tales


CPO (WS) (UW) Anth Greening MWS Collingwood

It was whilst instructing the S2087 course that PO Jase Price, former CPO TASI Ron Hobden (my simulator controller) and I and had a revelation whilst leafing through the Dockyard Dandy. In February's edition there was a small article from the Imperial War Museum about their 'Century of War and Peace' photograph collection and this was the picture included.....

50 years on from the original picture training continues the same well-trodden path, theory followed by practical application followed by assessment, providing skilled UW rates at all levels to front line units. Although light hearted in approach I thought it was important to capture the continuity of our branch and provide a gentle reminder that there is 50 years between these photographs but its 98 years since sound was first transmitted into water to search for the enemy and we're still going strong.

In other news I've been fortunate to be seconded into the Type 26 Global Combat Ship ASW development team and as such I will be in a position to provide you with regular updates on the future vision of the RN with thirteen of these platforms expected to roll out between now and 2033.



The contract with BAE is expected to be confirmed by the end of this year and building will commence shortly after with the first of class due to commission in 2020/1. The first 8 are designated as ASW capable platforms and at present are due to be fitted out with S2050 Hull Mounted Sonar and S2087 LFAS as standard, the rest of the details will be confirmed as and when the contract is finalised.

Well all that's it for this edition hope it's been worth a read? All that remains is for me to wish you all a Happy Easter wherever you may be afloat or ashore. I'll be back in the next edition with more tales from the schoolyard; and remember.....
