

Life as an XO

Life onboard a P2000 for a CPO(UW)

I joined HMS Dasher in January 2013 taking over from Smokey Funnell. Smokey kept on telling me what a good draft it was and one of the best he has had in the Mob......

Well, after a week onboard I had Staff Covered Continuation Training, basically a dummy OST but worse!

Having taken my UW hat off I now had to put my XO, MO, SA, Caterer, Reggie, ITSO and USO hats on. SCCT is only two legs long but they cram a lot into two days. The first forenoon is an Admin inspection (I have a lot of logs onboard!!!) and then a day and a half of Fires, Floods, MOBEX, MBDD, Blind Pilotage and Index berthing for the CO and myself.

In fact during the next couple of months I had even had a few more inspections from H&S and Security audits and then even Base Logistics Inspection?

The next major event that occurred was my first Sea weekend with the students, and my first experience of going shopping for a group of 16 personnel for a weekend. If you don't enjoy shopping with the wife this is not the job for you!

The sea weekend starts on the Friday when the students come down and prep the weekend passage on the charts. We then sail Saturday morning and normally head for some port on the west coast. The students do Navigation Training which includes them doing OOW, QM and putting fixes on. In amongst this I will throw in a MOBEX and Fire or Flood exercise just to keep them on their toes!

Once alongside the students will do a wash-down and cook evening meal before going ashore. One member of the Ship's Company remains onboard with the duty student's

whilst the rest head off to their hotel (which has been previously booked by me).

We then sail back to Devonport on the Sunday morning doing more training en route.

During any training year we conduct two "deployments" the first is around Easter (3 weeks) and a summer one (6-7 weeks). This is where I witnessed the job for what it was. Summer deployment in 2013 saw us do over 30 different stops, some of the places I had never previously heard of before which indicates the diversity and variety that the deployments provide. The deployment is split into 3 phases whereupon the students swap for each part. Some of the places we visited during summer were as follows Helgoland, Enkhausen, Vlissingen, Bruges, Shevenigen and many, many more.

As a P2000 is only 50 tons and 20 mtrs long we can get into some really small marinas and ports where you will never normally go on a "pussers" grey, however the down side is they roll about in the slightest sea state, so if you suffer from sea sickness avoid a P2000!

So far I have had a busy but enjoyable year on HMS Dasher and look forward to my deployments next year and of course hopefully getting back into the ASW world early 2015.

Good afternoon from the Underwater Warfare Training Element (UWTE) at the Maritime Warfare School (MWS) at HMS Collingwood. That's quite enough abbreviation for a preface so I'll keep the rest of the article simple. The current incarnation of TAS/S/UW training has taken place her at the home of the WE's for the last ten years. Cook, Cunningham and the ASUAT are dead! Long live the Maritime Composite Training System (MCTS) which has given us a 40 year leap ahead in capability in technology and capability. Instructors when not employed in UW work carry on with the usual trappings of Service life; Divisions, Duties, Rounds, Inspections and Visits as per usual. Turn around in the Section stands at about 15-24 Months, for instance I joined from Northumberland in May and am not due to move on until 2015. Next year promises to be busier with a ramp up in S2087 courses with our very own Chairman coming back through he school in Jan (Stand by Tanzy!). There will be further tales from the school yard in later editions, so I will wish you all a Merry Xmas and a prosperous New Year whether at home or deployed, and remember as they say "Another day, another Doppler"

OUR MAN IN VALPARAISO



Buenas Dias Compardres,

As some of you may be already aware the Chilean Navy and the Royal Navy has had a Close relationship for almost a hundred years now and indeed if it was not for the closeness of that relationship history shows that Chile wouldn't be the country it is today.

The Chilean Navy is assessed as the 4th largest within the Americas behind USA, Canada and Brazil and they have just had S2087C SONAR fitted to CNS FF Condell (Formerly HMS MARLBOROUGH).

To that end I visited Chile as part of a FOST team to assist them conduct their first ACT ASW during Dec 2013. This exercise included a Scorpene Class SM (OHIGGINS), 2 x MPA, and 2 x Maritime Patrol Helicopters.

The exercise followed a similar format to the UK ACT ASW and was a mixture of that and The FOST ASW Weekend with a few local variations. For a starter the depth of water In the Chilean Exercise areas varies between 500 all the way down to 6000 metres, so Those of you with an understanding of Oceanography will obviously recognise that it is a Far more challenging waterspace to operate within than the SWAPS or the GOO!

I am not at liberty to discuss any further specifics of the exercise but let me tell you this, the FOST TART have come away having identified many lessons (which we will endeavour

to Feedback to the S2087 Community in due course via DLMS). And the words very long range Convergence Zone Detections will be prevalent!

On a more light hearted note I can also let you know that yes, the Scandanavia Bar is still Open in Valpo (albeit we did not attend), and the Wine and Pisco in Chile is still very Strong!
